SHORT PASSING EVENTS

During the past few afternoons a number of people have been seen fishing off the market dock.

The freight platform in the rear of the Trent river warehouse, upon which work was begun several weeks ago has been completed.

A visitor in this city yesterday from Pamlico county stated that the present prospect for a good crop of watermelons and canteloupes in that section this season was very discouraging. There has been but very little rain in that section during the past few weeks and in a number of places the vines are drying up.

Next Monday morning the members of the Atlantic Hose Team who are to participate in the interstate firemen's tournament to be held at that place June 27-29, will leave for Columbia S. C. The horse and wagon have already been sent to that city and the boys feel assured of winning the first prize in the hose wagon race.

Yesterday was another "acrobatic" at noon the mercury registered 87 degrees in the shade and at 2 o'clock it had advanced several degrees and only those who had business to attend to were seen on the streets. A thermometer placed out in the open where the sun's full rays could strike it, registered 116 degrees at 1:30 o'clock.

Mr. B. B. Davenport informed the reporter yesterday morning that he had sold from his farm a number of ears of roasting corn. Mr. Davenport's farm is located in Pamlico county and as these are the first ears of corn seen on the local market this season, that county claims the distinction of being the first county in this section to put corn on the market this season.
