MORSE MUST SERVE SENTENCE

Writ of Habeas Corpus Denied. Sentence of Ten Years Good Perhaps Longer.

Atlanta, Ga., June 28.—Charles W. Morse was denied the writ of habeas corpus for which he applied to Federal Judge Newman to obtain his release from the Atlanta prison, where he is serving a 15-year sentence for violation of the national banking laws.

Judge Newman did not pass upon the contention that Morse could not be forced legally to serve more than 10 years of his sentence, but he sustained the validity of 10 years of the sentence. He rejected Morse's plea that the Atlanta prison could not be used for the confinement of those sentenced to imprisonment without hard labor.

"I do not think that any relief can be granted under this position at this time," said Judge Newman. "The question is what of this position represents anything which would require that something be done now for the position. I think this is a serious questionably good for 10 years. Whether it is good for 15 years cannot be passed on at this time. The time has not come to decide that. I would questionably have no right now to take any with the sentence, even if it is for 10 years. I do not believe that Morse's status as a prisoner can be determined upon a writ of habeas corpus which is presented in this case, is an advisory petition. The writ of habeas corpus is to determine whether or not the prisoner shall be discharged or reinstated."

I do not see how upon such a point the question of hard labor can be determined. If, however, I were to give a judgment upon this question, I would say, upon authorities quoted, that the Atlanta penitentiary can be used for those sentenced to imprisonment without hard labor. If it is otherwise, the most I could do would be to decide that the action of the court or other proper authorities be required to transfer Morse to a more desirable situation. I do not think this would be more desirable than the present place of imprisonment. Indeed, I would think it would be unfortunate if the prisoners were not compelled to do some kind of work.

The following letter furnished by Miller & Co., cotton brokers, Richmond, Va., is of interest to cotton growers and buyers:

Weather conditions continue the ruling faction in our market and on the receipt of private dispatches reporting increased cloudiness and increasing showers in Texas; especially the Panhandle districts, the early improvement was dissipated and prices showed a net decline from yesterday's close of about 19 to 15 points.

Trading was largely restricted to the professional element, as the speculative public is holding off pending a more intelligent view of weather conditions and crop prospects.

HOT TIME AGAIN IN GEORGIA

Recently-Elected Governor Hoke Smith Will Make Hard Fight For Senator Terrell's Toga.

Washington, June 29.—Unusual interest is manifested in Democratic political circles here in the Senatorial fight in Georgia on July 10th to decide whether Hon. Joseph Meriwether Terrell shall continue to represent the State in the Senate of the United States or be succeeded by Hon. Hoke Smith, former governor of Georgia and the present governor-elect.

As is well known, Senator Terrell was appointed by Governor Brown to fill out the unexpired term of the late Senator A. S. Clay. During nearly all of his service Senator Terrell has been in very poor health, as he had a stroke of paralysis which has sadly interfered with his locomotion, and it is with much difficulty that he can get about. His mental, however, has not been weakened, and the report is that he and his supporters are going to put up a strong battle at the primary, and have been confidently claiming that they will vanquish former Governor Hoke Smith.

HOUSE INCREASES MEMBERSHIP

Senate Reports Bill to Give That Body Forty-Two More Members.

Washington, June 29th.—The Senate Committee on Census has agreed to report the Congressional reapportionment bill without amendment, providing for 423 representatives, notwithstanding practically all the committee members had expressed themselves as opposed to the increased representation.

The bill provides for 423 representatives over the present number, and was framed so as to prevent a decrease of the membership from any State. Three of the ten members present, Senators La Follette, De Font and McLean voted in the negative, but while expressing disapproval of the increase the other 7 decided to allow the House to have its way in a matter so peculiarly pertaining to its own affairs. The report will be withheld for a week to give Mr. La Follette time to prepare a minority report, which will be presented by Senator Bailey.

Examination For the Army.

A letter was received in this city recently from the office of the Adjutant General in Washington, D. C., stating that examinations for civilians, desiring to enter the army with the rank of second lieutenant, will be held in this section of the South, beginning September 5th. It has only been made possible by a comparatively recent act of Congress, that an applicant could step from the duties of ordinary life into the ranks of a commissioned officer in Uncle Sam's army, and there is no doubt but that a large number of aspirants will be on hand at these examinations. The examination will be of three parts: the physical, in which, failure precludes all possibilities of the candidate standing the remaining two; the preliminary mental examinations, allowing the prospective officer to stand the competitive. The successful candidates will be picked from the number with the highest grades on this first examination.

Such a position would prove particularly attractive to young men between the ages of 21 and 27, who have developed a latent ambition to enter into this branch of government service, and provides the same rank as is accorded a graduate of West Point. The plan for holding the examinations has not yet been selected, but will be in that section of the Carolinas and Georgia which provides the greatest number of candidates. Full information may be obtained from the office of the Adjutant General of the United States, concerning the scope and character of the examination.
