HALIFAX MAN IS APPOINTED

Gov. Kitchin Appoints Mr. F. L. Travis Corporation Commissioner to Fill Vacancy.

Raleigh, July 12.—E. L. Travis, of Halifax, has received from governor Kitchin his commission as Corporation Commissioner to succeed the late Henry Clay Brown. He went before Judge W. R. Allen in the office of ex-Governor Charles B. Aycock and took the oath of office and assumed the duties of the commissionership.

It is learned that the matter of appointment was secured Monday morning in conference between the Governor or Mr. Travis. He went home to adjust his affairs so that he might take up his official duties as soon as the commission was issued. Mr. Travis is one of Governor Kitchin's closest personal and political friends and has been a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee for 12 years and chairman of the Halifax county Committee since 1898. He was for a number of years chairman of the board of directors of the state penitentiary and has served four terms as State Senator.

DEPARTMENTS WILL GIVE INFORMATION

President Will Let Congress Draw Its Own Conclusion On Alaskan Matter.

Washington, July 12.—Although many denials have been made that government officials intended to permit the Guggenheim interests to control Alaskan transportation through a monopoly on the water front of Controller Bay, in that territory, the administration had decided to let Congress reach its own conclusion and every scrap of information relating to the matter will be sent to the Senate as soon as possible.

While President Taft and the members of his cabinet have voiced the opinion that an investigation will show nothing even remotely resembling such an attempt to favor the Guggenheim interests, an attempt in which the names of C. P. Taft, the President's brother and former Secretary of the Interior Ballinger have been coupled, they determined that every effort should be made to clear the situation.

At the regular session of the Cabinet yesterday the Controller Bay affair was discussed at length. It was decided that all the departments interested—War, Agriculture, Interior and Commerce and Labor—should be urged to make their reports on the case as quickly as possible. It was stated tonight that all the documentary evidence in the case probably will be in the President's hands early next week, and that it then will be sent immediately to the Senate, in answer to a resolution adopted late in June, calling for all such information.

A list of witnesses made up by the committee conducting the inquiry is said to include the following:

Chas. P. Taft, brother of the President; Daniel Guggenheim, head of the Alaska Syndicate; Frank H. Hitchcock, postmaster-general; Walter L. Fisher, Secretary of the Interior; Richard S. Ryan, the alleged promoter; and a large number of land office clerks. The inquiry promises to be a long one.

DEMOCRATS CAN TAKE CAMPAIGN

Judge Alton B. Parker Feels Greatly Encouraged at Outlook For Democracy.

Washington, July 12.—Former Judge Alton B. Parker, of New York, who has been in Washington in consultation with President Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, relative to the contempt proceedings against the federation officials, conferred at the capital with many of the Democratic leaders in both houses of Congress.

There were numerous exchanges of views regarding the political situation, and a fairly general expression of hope from the Democratic standpoint.

"Experience has made us cautious in the matter of prediction," said Mr. Parker, "but the outlook certainly is better than usual."

Some of the Democratic Congressmen told Mr. Parker that they would not be disappointed should they see the Democratic ticket headed with his name as in 1904.

Judge Parker said the Gompers case would again come up in the district supreme court on July 17th, but refused to comment on the possible outcome.
