DOWNING DOWN BY FORE CLAY IMAGES.

The esteemed News-Observer has become finally satisfied, that it was slipping wrongly through un-tiltingly, at the shrine of Insurgency, in the hope that from these seeming-to-be-reformers, not only the country would be the gainer, but Democracy through the change of political heart of these Insurgents, would profit thereby.

Says the News-Observer:— One year ago the country resounded with praise of the Republican Insurgents because it believed they were leading a fight to free the country from partisanship in legislation with "the interests." They made a notable fight against the Payne-Aldrich tariff act and their speeches did much to expose the iniquities of that "bill of obnoxiousness." They returned this session upon the flood tide of popularity. They awoke to find themselves famous, and all they had to do to retain popular confidence was to continue the policy they laid down at the last session. It is a matter for regret that they did not remain as firm for tariff reduction and against privilege and sectionalism as they seemed then.

It is impossible for the Journal to accept as sincere, except parenthetically, this grief of the News and Observer over the tumble of Insurgency, the revealing of the clay in this image that promised to be genuine political gold. It would be natural for the News-Observer, as the Democratic organ of this State, to wish to see political reforms that tended to help its own political side. While deprecating the fall of Insurgency, simply from the position of one viewing the fall of an apparent righteous movement, the News-Observer might shed tears or express regrets, but those who accepted seriously the reform protestations one year ago or at any time, of Senator Bristow and his ilk, must have been wanting very badly to worship something. Genuine Democracy has the principles to make for reform and advancement of the people's interests. Straying after false gods leads to but one end—disaster. The world has good principles, enough to cover everything political, social and religious. It is only when man refuses to acknowledge principles as being live and vital, that the chase begins after "ologies and isms. There are men who stand for principles, and any one can see their genuineness. It is enough to follow these and not be tempted away by noise and many promises.

Notice. By the Board of Aldermen of the city of New Bern, be it ordained, Section 2. That it shall be the duty of every person, partnership, firm, association, or corporation, made liable to any license tax for the privilege of carrying on any trade, profession, business, occupation or calling in the city, to register with the city clerk, his, their or its name or style, place of residence, trade, profession, business, occupation or calling, and street address of the place where such trade, profession, business, occupation or calling is to be carried on. No license shall be granted until such registry has been made. Any person violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, for each offense, be liable to the sum of five dollars, to be paid to the city of New Bern.
