COOL WAVE APPROACHING

Weather Bureau Predicts Unusually Cool, Unsettled Weather For This Week.

Washington, D. C., July 17.—Following the hot wave that recently brought death and suffering to the whole country, this week's weather promises to furnish surprises in the other direction, with the receipt that unusually low summer temperatures probably will prevail. The Weather Bureau sees in an abnormally high barometric pressure over the interior of Canada and Alaska, and relatively low pressure in the Atlantic Ocean, the conditions that will usher in a cool wave.

"This pressure distribution is strongly indicative of temperatures below the seasonable average the coming week," said a Weather Bureau representative. "In all parts of the country from Montana to the Atlantic Coast. The week will open with generally fair weather east of the Rocky Mountains, except that showers are probable Tuesday in the Middle Atlantic and New England States and during the next several days in the South Atlantic and Gulf States. An era of unsettled weather and showers will develop over the Middle West about Thursday, and thence spread eastward to the Atlantic States by the latter part of the week."

No Pension Legislation This Session.

Washington, July 15.—All hope of pension legislation at this session of Congress was dashed today when Democratic Leader Underwood served notice that such legislation would be taken up at the proper time at the regular session in December. Just before the House Saturday adjourned until next Wednesday, Representative Kendall, of Iowa, insurgent Republican, objected to an adjournment over Monday, when, under the rules, a pension increase bill could be considered. Mr. Underwood said the bill which would be brought in by the Democratic majority at the regular session would be different from that favored by the Republicans in that it would not provide pensions for "soldiers who had never been within 500 miles of a battlefield."

SAYS ROOSEVELT FAVORED JAPANESE

Count Witte Thinks That Former President Worked Bluff on Russia.

St. Petersburg, July 17th.—Count Witte, the eminent Russian statesman, in a forthcoming pamphlet on his version of the negotiations for the treaty of peace between Russia and Japan, held at Portsmouth, will assail former President Roosevelt as siding with the Japanese in that memorable event. The Count says that at the first meeting of the conference in the United States the Japanese submitted their peace conditions, twelve in number, but that they were absolutely unacceptable. In particular he rejected the four final conditions—the Japanese demand for indemnity, limitation for Russia's maritime power in the Pacific, the surrender of Saghalien and the surrender of the Russian warships stationed in neutral ports. This threw the negotiations in to a bad way, when President Roosevelt prevailed upon the Japanese to submit their first eight points for discussion, when ended by an agreement being reached upon this much of the treaty.

As to the four remaining counts, the Japanese offered to give up the indemnity demand, limitation of power in the Pacific and delivery of Russian warships, but insisted of the cession of the southern part of Saghalien to Japan. This latter condition Count Witte refused, and at the last moment, when he was preparing to leave Portsmouth President Roosevelt, he says, sent a dispatch to the czar, in which he openly espoused the cause of Japan, declaring that he considered the Japanese demands justified and right. The czar responded by saying that peace could only be concluded on the basis of the first eight points, already concurred in. Thereupon Mr. Roosevelt, Count Witte says, informed the czar that \$50,000,000 was deposited by Japan with a number of American banks, which would be available to continue the war. At this critical juncture Japan waived her demands.

MUCK RAKE HITS DICKINSON

Former Attorney-General Ignored Charge as Well as Wickersham.

Washington, July 16.—The prompt investigation of Attorney-General Wickersham in connection with the news Alaska spoliation scandals was delayed unexpectedly by the absence of Judge Henry D. Clayton, chairman of the Committee on Judiciary.

Judge Clayton is to report the resolution of Delegate James Wickersham, calling on Attorney-General Wickersham for all information in connection with the alleged frauds in the award of coal contracts for use at the forts in Alaska, and for an explanation, why no prosecutions were undertaken until after the statute of limitations made criminal action impossible.

The House adjourned Saturday until Wednesday. Judge Clayton is expected to push the resolution through then.

Another important end to this scandal became known, when it was learned that General Dickinson, while Secretary of War, had similar information as to the frauds in the War Department's Alaskan coal awards submitted to him by Delegate Wickersham. General Dickinson ignored the complaint. So far as known, he never gave any reason why he failed to investigate these contracts until proofs of frauds submitted. The Department of Justice is apparently untroubled by the threat of impeachment and the numerous allegations of crimes and misdemeanors by Attorney-General Wickersham.

Few Rules of Postal Savings Bank.

The announcement made in The Journal Sunday morning that New Bern had been designated as one of the places at which a postal savings bank would soon be opened created considerable interest. No request for such an institution had been made and it was quite a surprise to the public. The banking rules and regulations of the postal savings bank are very peculiar. Not more than \$100 can be deposited during any one month by any one depositor and total deposits cannot exceed \$500. There is a provision, however, that patrons who so desire can invest their money in government bonds and in this way be able to deposit large amounts.
