COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

Men In Regular Session At Court House Yesterday. Considerable Business Transacted.

The Craven County Board of Commissioners met in regular monthly session at the court house in this city yesterday morning. Mr. J. R. Jenkins, of No. 9 Township, who was elected constable at the last election held in November, appeared before the Board and presented his official bond. The attorney passed on the bond as to its legal efficiency and surety and the Board ordered that it be accepted and was ordered recorded and filed and Mr. Jenkins was inducted into the office of constable.

A bill for \$4.00 was presented to the Board for the burial of a pauper. At the last legislature a bill was passed prohibiting any county to pay the burial expenses of any pauper who was not an inmate of the county home, a Confederate soldier or the widow of a Confederate soldier and that such bodies be given over to the State Board of Anatomy. When this law was brought before the Board several of the members and the attorney were in favor of paying the bill regardless, but the penalty attached to the law caused them to reconsider the matter. The presenter of the bill finally agreed to hold it over until the next meeting in order that the Board would have further time to investigate.

Several citizens from different sections of the county appeared before the Board and reported that bridges in their districts were in bad order. The Board ordered that these bridges be repaired as early as practicable.

Messrs. Asa Jones and E. K. Bryan were appointed cotton weighers for the 8th Township.

Mr. G. B. Waters presented a bond of \$50 and was re-appointed game warden for this county.

County Attorney Green made one suggestion that if put into effect would save the county several thousand dollars each year. He said that he was in favor of abolishing the method the Board now had of allowing a large number of papers ascertain amount of money each month. That if these people were not able to take care of themselves or had no relatives to care for them, they should be placed in the county home where they would be looked after and provided for. He stated further that if the Board rendered such a decision that there would be a number of them who would neither go to the county home or call on them for money but that they had relatives who rather than see them carried to county home would assist in supporting them. This suggestion, however was not acted upon at this meeting but will doubtless be taken up in one of the future meetings.

Mr. Wm. Dunn appeared before the Board and asked that the property of L. M. Biskely be stricken from the tax list. This was ordered done after the payment of all costs had been made.

A letter was ordered written to Mr. E. T. Lamb, President and general manager of the Norfolk-Southern Railway Company telling him of the bad condition of a number of bridges along that company's road in this county and asking him to have them repaired as early as possible in order that they would not be a menace to the public.

During the afternoon session the regular routine of looking over the passing upon the various bills brought before the Board was engaged in, after which the Board adjourned.

SIMMONS' INFLUENCE IS FELT

Cotton Manufacturers of North and South Carolina Given Hearing at His Request.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 7th.—The Senate Committee on Finance, has announced that as the result of the request of Senator Simmons of North Carolina brief hearings would be given Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday to cotton manufacturers on the cotton bill. The finance committee took up the bill Saturday. Senator Smoot moved that it be adversely reported. Senator Williams moved that a favorable report be made. In the discussion that followed Senator Simmons urged that the North and South Carolina manufacturers of cotton goods be given a hearing and the committee finally agreed to the three days delay. By order of the Senate, the bill will have to be reported back on Thursday Aug. 10th.

Whatever progress was made between Senator LaFollette and representative Underwood in arriving at a compromise on the wool tariff, was not made public. Democratic Leader Underwood, representing the Democratic majority of the House in the struggle now under way to reach an agreement, said tonight that the conferences with Senator LaFollette will be resumed Monday, but that a compromise wool bill is not likely to be offered to Congress for three or four days.

The full joint conference committee consisted of 5 senators and 5 representatives, met over the wool bill, but decided to give Senator LaFollette and Mr. Underwood a further opportunity to reach an agreement. The free list bill was referred to the same negotiators who now have in their care all the points of tariff difference between the two Houses. Upon their ability to reach an agreement on the two bills rests the prospect of the passage of compromise wool and free list tariff bills.

JACKSONVILLE'S MORNING FIRE

J. B. Lee's Store at That Place Gutter by Flames at an Early Hour Yesterday Morning.

Fire of unknown origin, which originated in the rear of the building destroyed the Dr. D. L. Kellum building at Jacksonville and also damaged Mr. George A. Hurst's building yesterday morning shortly after 4 o'clock. The Kellum building was occupied by Mr. J. B. Lee who conducted a general merchandise business and he had a stock of goods worth about \$4,000 upon which he carried \$1,700 insurance.

When first discovered the fire had gained but little headway, but for fact that it was located where it was unusually hard to reach could doubtless have been distinguished had immediate action been taken, however, before the heat fire company had reached the scene of the blaze the flames had gained so much headway that they devoted their entire efforts to save the adjoining buildings.

Mr. Geo. A. Hurst's store, which is located adjacent to the structure which was destroyed, was in danger several times but by heroic efforts the fire fighters succeeded in saving it before it had been badly damaged. As it was only the walls of the building were burned.

It is supposed that a box of matches that had been left in an exposed place, and which had been ignited by rats was the cause of the conflagration, as there had been no one in the building during the day. It could not be learned whether Dr. Kellum carried any insurance on the building.

NARROWLY ESCAPES DEATH

Negligence of Atlantic Coast Line R. R. Co. Causes Mr. J. W. Stewart to be Injured.

A large bolt used in fastening rails together and which had been carelessly left protruding from the Atlantic Coast Line Railway Company's tracks near End street came near causing Mr. J. W. Stewart to receive serious if not fatal injuries yesterday morning.

Early in the day Mr. Stewart had one of his horses hitched to a buggy and started out to the western part of the city to attend to some business matters. While driving along the Atlantic Coast Line tracks near End street, the rear wheel of his buggy caught over a large spike which had been carelessly left protruding several inches from the track, and the wheel was pulled entirely off the axle and demolished. The accident occurred so quickly that Mr. Stewart did not have time to realize what had happened before he was thrown from the vehicle and landed upon one of the heavy rails upon his forehead and received a number of cuts on his forehead and also other minor injuries on different parts of his body.

The animal did not immediately stop and it was several minutes before Mr. Stewart, who had been dazed by the contact with the rail had sufficiently recovered to go after the animal and his damaged buggy. However, he succeeded in stopping the horse before the buggy was further damaged.

When seen at his office yesterday afternoon Mr. Stewart stated to a Journal reporter that he was feeling the effects of his accident, but that he was glad to have escaped with as few injuries as he had received.
