GREAT ENGLISH STRIKE CONTINUES

Famine Threatens Liverpool. The American Tourists Cannot Get Home 200,000 on Strike.

Liverpool, Aug. 17.—Flour-mill owners and bakers served notices upon the city authorities that they can no longer supply flour or bread because of strike conditions. The supply of coal and grain is exhausted and with the closing of the mills the bakers' ovens will remain cold. There is not enough flour in the city to last two days, and if the railroad strike is declared tonight there will be small chance of getting more.

The city is on the verge of famine as all foodstuffs are becoming scarce and prices soaring. Butter, eggs and milk are not to be had in most restaurants. Thousands in the city are destitute. They face starvation if conditions are not improved.

More than 1,000 anxious Americans are being cared for in the local hotels at the expense of the steamship companies, and their number is being increased, daily as the result of the strike and lockout along the docks. They are first class cabin passengers anxious to return home from their holidays abroad.

The steamers Caronia, Zealand, Haverford and Celtic are all tied up in the harbor, and it is officially stated that the companies do not know when they will be able to sail for America.

DISLIKES LIVERPOOL BILLS

Of Lading. Board of Trade Says It's An Insult and Invites Dealers of The South To Arrange A Bill of Lading.

New Orleans, La., Aug. 17.—Branding the proposed plan of the Liverpool cotton bill of lading committee to institute in New York a clearing house for the validation of cotton bills of lading as a "direct reflection and insult upon those engaged in the exporting of cotton," placing itself upon record as opposing the plan in its entirety, the New Orleans Cotton Exchange has through its board of directors passed resolutions to this effect, and approved the report of its special committee appointed to investigate the proposition.

The directors also adopted resolutions inviting all Southern exchanges, boards of trade, bankers and exporters and others interested in the handling of cotton to meet here in joint conference, probably during the annual convention of the American Bankers' Association, about November 20th next for the purpose of adopting measures for their mutual interest.

Trent Road Becoming a Handsome Thoroughfare.

A Warning.

In a circular sent out by Mr. James R. Young, State Insurance Commissioner, all persons are warned against firing woodland, either maliciously or carelessly. The circular states: "If any person shall set fire to any woods, except it be his own property, or, in that case, without first giving notice in writing to all persons owning lands adjoining the woodlands intended to be fired, at least two days before the time of firing such woods, and also taking effectual care to extinguish such fire before it shall reach any vacant or patented lands, near to or adjoining the lands so fired, he shall, for every such offense, forfeit and pay to any person who shall sue for the same, fifty dollars and be liable to any one injury in an action, and shall moreover be guilty of a misdemeanor."
