WEST INDIAN HURRICANE COMING.

Coast Points in South Carolina Cut off By Storm. High Tides Reported.

Norfolk, August 28.—A real genuine, accompanied by a zephyr with a speed of anywhere from forty-five to sixty miles an hour, say government weather men on its way north and may engulf Norfolk in its tempestuous grip within the next twenty-four hours, unless in the meantime its direction swerves and it makes off to sea about Hatteras. It was first observed at Jacksonville about 3 o'clock yesterday morning where the wind attained a velocity of forty-eight miles an hour.

Hurricane warnings have been displayed at Jacksonville and storm signs at every coast town and station as far north as Norfolk. Shippers on outward bound ships have been warned to expect a heavy storm. The course of the hurricane was north-west from the West Indies, but it is expected to assume a more northerly course. Weather observers are of the opinion that it may change its course at Hatteras and make off to sea.

At Charleston, S. C., the storm was marked by very high tide, extremely heavy wind and heavy rainfall, the gauge recording 2.16 inches at that place and 1.20 inches at Wilmington. The approach of the hurricane was observed at Charleston about 8 o'clock yesterday morning and the Norfolk weather office has been taken hourly observations. The night report issued at 8 o'clock last night showed the storm to be stationary, but increasing in violence.

Savannah, Ga. Aug. 27.—Charleston, Beaufort and other smaller South Carolina coast points are completely cut off from communication with the outside world, as the result of a severe storm which broke over this section early tonight. The wind here reached a velocity of sixty miles an hour and considerable damage to property. So far as is known no lives have been lost. Complete details will be delayed owing to the destruction of the all wire communication.

Very high tides are reported from Tybee Island, and earlier, before the wires were lost from Beaufort, S. C. Efforts to get into communication by wireless with Charleston also failed and nothing is known here of the extent of damage there.

Blazing rockers were sent far into the murky sky above Savannah tonight warning inhabitants of exposed islands along the Georgia coast.

Around the World in Forty Days.

Paris, August 28.—Andre Jaeger-Schmidt, the Parisian journalist, drove in an automobile to the Daily Excelsior office at 9:02 a. m. officially completing his circuit of the world in 29 days, 19 hours, 43 minutes and 37.45 seconds.

Jaeger-Schmidt started from Paris at 1:45 p. m., July 17, to beat the 63 day record of M. Stiegler, of the Paris Matin. Jaeger-Schmidt could have arrived at his goal in Paris two hours earlier if he had not stayed at Oberbourg after midnight for a supper given in his honor by a number of journalists.

CAPTAIN OF SLOCUMB PAROLED

Master of Steamer That burned at Hell Gate With Loss of 1,000 Lives.

New York, Aug. 28.—Capt. William H. Van Schaick, who was commander of the excursion steamer General Slocumb when it burned in Hell Gate June 15, 1904, with the loss of a thousand lives has been paroled by the United States government and returned to his home in this city from Sing Sing prison.

It was a surprise to his wife and family and to the captain himself. The old man, now 72 years of age, was almost overcome when Warden John S. Kennedy, of Sing Sing, told him today that parole papers had arrived from Attorney General Wickert.

Following the historical catastrophe, the captain of the Slocumb was made a Federal prisoner on a charge of criminal neglect of duty for the failure to provide worthy fire protection and life preservers on the steamer.

At the time of Capt. Van Schaick's conviction, there was considerable popular sympathy with him because all the punishment for the terrible accident fell on his shoulders. Even the families of the victims came to feel the seeming injustice of his bearing the burden alone and many of them signed a petition for the captain's pardon, which was sent to Washington.
