## ELECTION EXPENSE LAW JOKER

Candidates For Congress Must File Statements, But Law Does Not Require Them To Be Made Public.

Washington, August 31.—Primary election expense statements from Senator Martin and Swanson of Virginia, the first to be filed under the new publicity law that went into effect August 19th, reached the office of Secretary Bennett, of the Senate, yesterday. In the absence of Mr. Bennett, officials of his office declined to make them public.

Following this declination a careful examination of the new publicity law resulted in the startling disclosure that in the act, presumed to be most exact, there is no requirement for publicity of the individual statements filed by candidates for the Senate or the House of Representatives.

The law required the filing, not later than ten days before the primary election, of individual expense statements and pledges of appointments. There is no provision, however, for the method of making these statements public. It is apparently being left to the discretion of the Senate's secretary or the House clerk. Much surprise was expressed when it was found that the law was entirely silent on the point.

Congressmen Glass and Jones of Virginia, contestants in the Senatorial primaries to be held Sept. 7, had not submitted their expense statements today and apparently stood in violation of the law.

Secretary Bennett probably will confer with Attorney-General Wickersham before deciding upon whether the statements shall be given out.

Senator Heyburns of the committee on privileges and elections, expressed the opinion that all documents on file in the Senate in the secretary's office, excepting those relating to executive sessions, were open to the public.

## WANTS PARCELS POST ESTABLISHED

Important Recommendations To Be Made by Secretary Hitchcock.

Washington, Aug. 31.—An outline of the programme of legislation for the postal service, which Postmaster General Hitchcock will ask the Congress to follow during the regular session to begin in December, was indicated by Mr. Hitchcock yesterday.

In his annual report, which will be laid before Congress in December, Mr. Hitchcock will recommend the establishment of a parcels post service on rural mail routes, the crystallization into law of proposed increase in second class mail rates, and the enactment of the proposed law providing for a radical change in the system of compensating the railways for transporting the mails.

Mr. Hitchcock explained that it was his idea first to establish parcels post on the rural routes, in order that the administrative details of the system might be worked out without disadvantage to the postal service generally. Gradually, he would extend the parcels service to urban communities so that packages and parcels might be delivered locally by city carriers. Subsequently, the service would be extended to include railway transportation.

## THINKS TAFT'S STAND LUDICROUS

Kansas Representative Says President Knows Nothing About Tariff, LaFollette Deep Student.

Salma, Kan., Aug. 31.—Replying to Taft's speech at Hamilton, Mass. last Saturday, Senator Bristol, (Rep., Kan.) has issued the following statement:

Heretofore our Presidents when visiting the people, have realized the dignity of the great office they hold, and abstained from making offensive political speeches. They have not indulged in political arguments common to professional campaign stump speakers.

It is commendable in the Democrats, according to the President, to aid him in taking from the farmer the benefit of the protective tariff, and discreditable in them when they undertook to reduce the excessive duties on trust controlled products.

As to the Wool bill, LaFollette aided by the ablest experts in the country spent months in the preparation of the LaFollette Wool bill, and it is no exaggeration to say there was probably more thorough and painstaking work expended in the preparation of that bill than has ever been expended on any single tariff schedule. For Taft, whose superficial knowledge of the tariff is well known to all, to criticize LaFollette and state that his bill was prepared "in ignorance" is ludicrous in the extreme.

From Taft's speech it clearly appears that he is in favor of free trade for the farmer and high protection for the manufacturer. I do not agree to that new tariff doctrine.

## Sugar Still Going Up.

New York, Aug. 31.—Grocery circles here showed concern today over the high prices now prevailing in the sugar market. There was another advance in granulated during the day to 4 1/2 cents, representing a full cent raise in the last few weeks and the highest level in many years.

Coming at the height of the canning season, this advance is of vital interest to consumers all over the country. It is attributed primarily to a poor sugar beet crop in Europe, following prolonged drought this summer. To make matters worse, the Cuban crop, which furnishes the bulk of the raw material for American refiners, also proved short, and prices began to soar.

Far sighted dealers bought large supplies some months ago, leaving the market bare of stock and raw sugar in consequence have made new high records, while many operators in the market predict that the end is not yet in sight.
