MAY FRENCHMEN LOWER PRICES

Crusade Started in Paris and Other Cities Against High Prices on Food.

Paris September 1.—A campaign which has for its purpose a reduction of the high prices of food has been started in Paris. Ten taxicabs, which occupants carrying devices on which were inscribed demands that the costs of necessities be lowered, paraded through the Champs Elysees and other thoroughfares.

Open agitation, with some violence is going on in 30 or 40 towns and cities in the northern departments, and the movement is spreading to other parts of France.

Energetic demonstrations are being held at Orleans, the capital of the Department of Loiret.

Department of Nord, France, Sept. 1.—Banners bearing the inscription 'Buter at thirty sous or revolution' were borne in a procession of 20,000 persons mostly women here yesterday. As they marched they sang revolutionary hymns.

Lille, France, Sept. 1.—The general confederation of labor has taken up the agitation against the high price of food. Six thousand metal workers voiced their protest by parading through the streets.

St Quentin, Sept. 1.—Serious riots over the high price of food occurred here last night. The mob wrecked and pillaged several butchers shops and set fire to one of them in spite of the efforts of the police and soldiers to maintain order. An urgent request has been sent to the government for additional troops.

Judging from this report at least half of the population of that little village turned out and assisted in the snake hunt.

The two children were attempting to cross the street and not realizing that they should not delay in doing this after they had started across, took their time. The auto driver blew his horn and they attempted to run but became confused and were almost under the wheels when the driver brought the machine to a stop.

Moore & Reaman, of Hookerton, who recently suffered a fire loss of their business and store, filed a petition in voluntary bankruptcy, and the first hearing was before Referee in Bankruptcy S. W. Smallwood, at New Bern, Thursday. There were several attorneys at the hearing, which was quite lengthy. Attorneys in the case were C. V. Cowper, of this city, representing the general creditors; J. P. Frazzelle, of Snow Hill, for the bankrupts; and L. V. Merrill, of Snow Hill, for the attached creditors. The hearing was continued.—Kinston Free Press.

MUNIFICENT GIFT TO COLLEGE

Davidson County Philanthropist Gives Greensboro Female College \$10,000

Greensboro, Sept. 1.—One of the largest gifts ever made for the education of young women in North Carolina has been made by Mr. J. W. Fitzgerald of Davidson county. Mr. Fitzgerald has agreed to donate to the trustees of Greensboro Female College the sum of \$10,000 for the purpose of erecting a dormitory on the condition that other friends of the college contribute \$15,000.

A few months ago the trustees decided to build a dormitory to cost \$25,000 as soon as the funds could be secured. During the past three years many students have been turned away for the lack of room and a new building was necessary before the patronage could be increased. W. M. Curtis, secretary and treasurer of the college, has been engaged in the campaign to raise the necessary \$25,000. He has secured up to this time \$6,000 and now the gift of Mr. Fitzgerald leaves only \$9,000 to be raised in order to secure the proposed new dormitory.

The Methodists of the state surely will not be slow in raising this amount so as to secure the much needed building.

Mr. Fitzgerald is a farmer. He is well known in Davidson county and is one of its best citizens. He is a loyal member of the Methodist Church and has been a philanthropist in a quiet way for many years. Through his generosity chiefly a splendid church was built near his home, and many times the benevolences and institutions of his Church have received his gifts. He has long been a friend of Greensboro Female College and educated some of his nieces there. A few years ago, when an effort was made to secure an endowment of \$100,000, Mr. Fitzgerald contributed \$1,000. Believing that he can make no better investment than to invest in an institution which has for its object the development of Christian womanhood, he now comes forward with this magnificent gift of \$10,000. Mr. Fitzgerald is not a man of large wealth, and this action of his will be an inspiration to others who have a desire to invest a part of their means for the uplift of humanity.

VESSEL SIGHTED ON FIRE

Schooner John Rose Burns on Frying Pan Shoals. No Signs of Crew.

Charleston, S. C., Sept. 1.—Capt. Googis, of the Chippewa, from Boston, reports August 30th, 13 miles northeast of Frying Pan Shoals, latitude 33:25 north, longitude 7:22 west. The schooner John Rose afloat. The Chippewa went to her assistance, but found no sign of life aboard. The head gear was gone and the forward house and foremast were standing. The after portion of the Rose was badly burned.

New York, Sept. 1.—Wireless reports received here yesterday afternoon from the steamer Oklahoma bound from New York to Port Arthur, Texas, tell of the burning of an unidentified schooner at sea. Only the mizzen-mast of the schooner was standing when the Oklahoma passed her, 15 miles southeast of Frying Pan Shoals, the dispatch states. The Oklahoma tried vainly to make out the name of the vessel and searched the rough sea in the vicinity in an equally vain endeavor to locate the crew.

Philadelphia, Sept. 1.—The John Rose was owned by Joseph W. Wilson, of this city, and was bound from Brunswick with a cargo of lumber for New York having sailed August 14. It is presumed she became water logged in the recent storm and was set ashore before being abandoned by her crew, which has been rescued by a passing steamer. The vessel registered 552 tons and was built in Wilmington, Del. in 1882.

Increase in South's Lumber Business.

New Orleans Sept. 1.—An increase of 99,172,000 feet of lumber exports from Southern ports for the 1910-12 season of 1909-10 is shown by a review of the official statistics of the exports of forest products to be published tomorrow by the lumber trade journal of this city.

Gulport is the leading lumber port, its total increase being 28,931,700 feet or about 61 per cent.

Mobile is second, Pensacola third and New Orleans fourth.

The total for the four ports for 1910-11 is 1,234,752,000, an increase of nearly 9 per cent.
