## PRESIDENT DEFIES HIS OPPONENTS

### Sure He Can Win West When He Presents His Side of Tariff.

Beverly, Mass., Sept. 2.—Highly delighted with his reception in Boston, where he addressed the members of the American Bar Association, President Taft returned here and dug into a preparation of speeches he will make on his coming Western tour, more than ever convinced that the vast majority of his party approve his course.

The President will continue the attitude he assumed in his recent speech at Hamilton. He is in no way discouraged by the open attacks made on it at the address by Democrats and Republican insurgents his friends say, and he believes that when he is able personally to tell the Western voters where he stands they will become as enthusiastic as he over scientific revision of tariff.

The Tariff Board is the President's special project and he is well satisfied personally, and continually impresses this fact on his advisers and visitors that his is the only way the tariff can be properly handled so that the interests of the people will not suffer and business conditions will not be upset.

He is looking forward to his giant "swing around the circle" with enthusiasm and the fact that he realizes his political opponents are planning to camp on his trial and challenge his position leads zest to the undertaking. Taft intends to make his Western invasion the big factor in his fight for another term, and he thinks that if his opponents try to meet his arguments they will simply clear the air for the 1912 battle.

#### Blames Lights for Getting Ashore.

Capt. Ches. A. Knudson, of the steamship "Mistral" which ran aground off Cape Lookout a few weeks ago arrived in Baltimore last Friday and gave out an interview in regard to his accident. ## STORE, OR BURN SOME

### Colonel Thompson Gives Advice Concerning Cotton Crop.

New York, Sept. 2.—Col. Robert M. Thompson declared that as a matter of money it would be better for the country if, in the event of the South producing the 15,000,000 bale cotton crop some persons profited, the farmers should turn two million bales in the fields.

"Better than that, however, would be the establishment of a warehouse system by which the surplus cotton could be held off the market," he said. "Joseph had the right idea back in the days of Pharaoh, when he stored up grain in fat years against the time when lean harvests threatened famine."

"It is entirely feasible to apply these methods to day, unless, perhaps the Sherman Anti-Trust law be held to forbid. In that event the Sherman Anti-Trust law should be amended or repealed."

## DATE IS SET FOR BIG EXHIBIT

### Agricultural Exhibit and Aviation Meet Will Be Held In This City On Nov. 22 and 23.

Yesterday at noon the New Bern Chamber of Commerce and the Craven County Farmer's Union met in joint session at the court house for the purpose of completing and perfecting plans for the big agricultural exhibit which is to be held in this city on November 22 and 23.

After Mr. D. P. Whitford had been elected chairman of the meeting and Mr. J. Leon Williams chosen as secretary, the gentlemen who had assembled to discuss the plans for the big event proceeded to transact the business before them. Mr. Williams stated that at the meeting which was held in his office on the previous Saturday a committee was appointed to select a site and secure donations for this exhibit. That this committee had begun work on the following Monday morning and had secured the old tobacco warehouse on north George street, which was generously donated for this event by Mr. G. S. Waters who holds a lease on the building. That after this building had been secured space for one hundred booths was marked out and that 66 of these booths had been sold to local merchants and manufacturers for \$5 each and that the remaining 34 could be sold without any doubt be disposed of without much trouble. This money, he said would be used in paying the expenses of the exhibit.

Mr. Larry I. Moore arose after Mr. Williams had concluded his report and congratulated the committees who have been so zealous in their work. He said that he was intensely interested in this exhibit and that he would lend his assistance in any way in making it a success. Further stated that an event of this variety was worth thousands of dollars to a town and New Bern could not afford to let it pass by at any cost, but that it would take considerable effort to make it a success and that every citizen should aid as much as possible in accomplishing this end.

Several of the members of the Farmer's Union then made short talks in which they expressed their intention of assisting as much as possible in making this exhibit the event of the year and that every farmer in Craven county would do likewise. The farmers clearly understand the fact that the agricultural part of the affair depends entirely upon them and unless they put their shoulders to the wheel and do all in their power the venture will be a complete failure.

After a number of other gentlemen had expressed their views the committee held a consultation and decided to have the exhibit on November 22 and 23. This date is only a few weeks distant and those who take part in the exhibit will have only a short while in which to do their work, but it was decided upon mainly on account of the fact that on those two days the famous Glenn H. Curtis can be secured to give two flights with his aeroplane and the committee and stand clearly that they will be compelled to have some such feature as this as a drawing card, and statistics of the various fairs and exhibits all over the country show that when some special feature is advertised that fully seventy-five per cent more people attend.

There was considerable discussion over the question of having the aeroplane. Mr. Williams stated that he had been in correspondence with Mr. Curtis and that he had agreed to make two flights here, each to last for 30 minutes for \$1,000. Of course this is rather a high price but several other aviators had put in their bids and these were from five hundred to one thousand dollars higher. The committee then decided that in order to raise the money to pay for these flights that they would circulate subscription lists all over the county, each person subscribing for one or more tickets at 50 cents each and a number of the gentlemen who were present were given one of these lists. These amounts are to be paid ten days after the tickets have been subscribed for and if one machine fails to fly, the money will be returned.

Taken as a whole there has never been any more interest shown in any similar movement than was yesterday at this meeting. Everybody present seemed to be enthused with the idea of progressiveness and each one was bent upon doing his share in securing this exhibit. The farmers in a joint committee will also be extended a cordial invitation to enter their live stock and farm products and compete for the many prizes that will be offered, for the purpose of accumulating the live stock that will be on display, temporary pens will be built on one side of the building.

In addition to the main exhibit it is more than probable that there will be a small " midway " where those who tire of viewing the exhibits may spend an hour or more enjoying the rides. Taken as a whole and unless some unexpected thing occurs this will be a gala week for this city and every citizen should not fail to honor the exhibit by attending the opportunity to attend.
