## NEW COLLECTOR OF PORT

John Biddle, of Craven County Receives Recess Appointment From President Taft.

What was known to a few for several days, became public Thursday when the papers from Washington City came with the notice that Mr. John Biddle, of this county, had been appointed on the 13th of September by President Taft U. S. Collector of Customs, District of Pamlico.

The matter of this appointment, of Mr. Biddle to succeed Mr. D. W. Patrick, has been of considerable local interest, as Mr. Biddle was a Craven county man, and it has long been contended that this office should have a local man. John Biddle has been a Republican of long standing, always prompt to the front as a party man, though his party has been a minority one for years. Mr. Biddle is of a well known family and is held in esteem by the people of his section. His appointment meets with general approval. As soon as Mr. Biddle makes his bond, which will be in a few days, he will take the office as Collector.

There is little doubt that Mr. Biddle's appointment will receive prompt Congressional confirmation in December, for President Taft has twice signified his approval of Mr. Biddle for this collectorship.

## SELL DUTCHMEN SALT HORSE

New Jersey Meat Packers Caught Pickling Diseased Horses For Human Consumption.

Trenton, N. J., Sept. 21.—The State Board of Health of New Jersey, at the direction of the United States Department of Agriculture, has notified the Attorney-General of New Jersey to take action against the Schwarz Brothers Company of Kearny, that state.

It is alleged that the Schwarz concern has been pickling diseased horse meat and sending it to Europe for human consumption. Most of the meat it is asserted, was shipped to Holland.

The Attorney General is asked to prosecute the Schwarz firm under the general provisions of the New Jersey law. One accusation is that the firm violated the provisions of the State's Pure Food law. The other is that the company transgressed the statute relating to slaughter house licenses.

The formal charges against the Schwarz Brothers company were embodied in a letter from the Bureau of Chemistry of the United States Department of Agriculture, The letter, dated Washington, Sept. 15, and signed by F. L. Dunlap, acting chief of the bureau, was addressed to Dr. R. B. Fitz-Randolph, State Board of Health, Trenton, N. J.

Chief Dunlap asserted that his inspectors had obtained conclusive evidence that the Schwarz Brothers' Co. was buying up horses, live or dead, turning part of them into fat and fertilizers, pickling the rest and shipping it to Rotterdam.

Secrecy, according to Dunlap, attended the preparation, pickling and shipment of the horse meat, and while it was generally known by the firm's employees that a traffic of this nature was being carried on, not more than two were sufficiently within the confidence of members of the firm to have accurate knowledge of the matter.

The government's charge is that the firm has prepared the carcasses of diseased and emaciated animals for human consumption; that horses were cut up for food on the same floor where lay gippered and other animals, killed by diseases communicable to man, and that the whole was packed and branded "pickled beef."

Only the timely arrival of government inspectors, as it is said, prevented a cargo of this alleged diseased and misbranded meat from being put aboard ship for export.

## ENORMOUS CATCHES OF FISH

Beaufort Packers Unable To Take Care Of The Great Quantities Brought In.

Beaufort Sept. 21.—The Beaufort men are making enormous catches for the past few days, in fact more than the packers and shippers could handle. The supply of ice from the I. & J. factories is entirely too inadequate for the needs of the packers and ice has to be brought from other places. A solid car load of twenty thousand pounds was brought from New Bern Thursday which relieved the situation somewhat. Wednesday, nine thousand pounds of the blue fish had to be thrown away because of the lack of ice and salt to preserve them.

## PEACE OF EUROPE THREATENED

Interrenal Troubles In All Countries. Alfonso of Spain Fighting For His Throne.

London, Sept. 21.—Serious unrest, ranging from a full-fledged revolution in Spain to strike riots in Ireland, prevails in Europe today. The internal commotions are so general and so varied in character that the peace of the continent is dangerously menaced.

In Spain all wires are interfered with and very little direct news is coming over the frontier, but it is certain Alfonso is fighting tooth and nail for his throne. The revolutionists are in the field well armed and equipped and the outcome will be in doubt for some time.

In Vienna martial law prevails because of the riots as protests against the high price of food.

In Budapest, also, there have been food riots and the police had to resort to extreme measures to restore order. Further trouble is feared.

Ireland is menaced by a general strike. By a big display of force the Government has prevented serious rioting.

In Russia, as the result of the assassination of Premier Stolypin, fears are entertained of great Jewish massacres and of reprisals by the Jewish and Finnish terrorists against high officials.

Ironworkers are on strike in Wales and in Scotland many trades are in difficulties.

Rioting has also been renewed in France as the result of the high price of food, but so far has not attained dangerous proportions.
