**MAKE LUMBER OUT OF PAPER**

Expert Says The Process is Cheaper Than Natural Lumber Can Be Grown.

Kansas, City, Mo., Sept 23—So nearly perfect is artificial lumber made from paper here there is no longer cause for great worry over forest conservation, said J. B. White, chairman of the executive committee of the National Conservation Congress here. He had just returned from a trip through Eastern States. Much of his time there was spent investigating the manufacture of "lumber" from paper.

"A superior quality of artificial lumber can be manufactured cheaper than natural lumber can be grown," he said.

Taking 57 per cent. waste paper, 22 per cent. straw, 5 per cent. jute and 16 per cent. wood fibre, a ton of fibre board, one-fourth inch thick of 1,100 feet of inch lumber can be produced."

**VISIBLE SUPPLY OF COTTON**

In Sight Considerably Larger Than Last Year.

New Orleans, Sept. 23—Secretary Hester's statement of the world's visible supply of cotton issued yesterday shows the total visible to be 1,921,700 bales against 1,697,944 last week and 1,776,120 last year. Of this the total of American cotton is 1,265,700 bales against 1,011,944 last week and 972,133 last year, and 1,766,928 year before last and of all other kinds, including Egypt, Brazil, India, etc., 655,000 bales against 786,000 last week and 641,000 last year.

Of the world's visible supply of cotton there is now afloat and held in Great Britain and continental Europe 919,000 against 854,000 last year; in Egypt 34,000 against 34,000 last year; in India 373,000 against 328,000 last year, and in the United States 596,000 against 355,000 last year.

**Shade Wooten Dead.**

LaGrange Sept. 23—Mr. Shade Wooten, Sr., died suddenly in this city yesterday afternoon of heart failure. He was 72 years of age and leaves a large family. His death removes from our community a most remarkable character. For four years Mr. Wooten gave of his best young manhood to his country in the civil war, and was seriously thought to be fatally wounded in the head. After returning to his farm in Greene county, he had the misfortune to lose one of his hands. Notwithstanding all these obstacles, he has raised a large family and left an estate of considerable size. Coming to LaGrange about 20 years ago, he engaged in business for a number of years and was successful.

Mr. Wooten was prominent throughout the county, and represented Lenoir in the general assembly of 1903.
