MORGAN DEFIES GOVERNMENT

Signs Steel Trust's Declaration To Ignore Court's Order To Dissolve.

New York, Sept. 28.—After coming to the rescue of his pet railway shares and the entire stock list in general on last Friday, J. P. Morgan went to his office before the market opened yesterday prepared to defend his title as financial king and, incidentally, pile up a few additional dollars for Morgan & Co. Morgan is determined that there shall be no financial panic precipitated as a result of the agitation among the great industrial combinations. It is because of this fact that he signed the Steel Trust's declaration of defiance to the Government.

By the power of his name he informed his associates he expected to reassure investors generally, and that he was correct in his views was shown by the fact that the London market, open hours before the American, was bullish in the extreme.

The Steel Trust intends to fight the Government. It is understood that at Tuesday's meeting of the directors Morgan severely criticized certain directors for having permitted the interference to get abroad that the trust was willing voluntarily to dissolve. Morgan, it is understood, called attention to the fact that the highest-priced lawyers in the world had passed on the organization and methods of the trust and that it was in a far better position to resist dissolution than at any previous time.

Just how strong the personality of J. P. Morgan really is was shown when the market opened. Excited groups of brokers fought for positions near the Steel pole and wild buying began. Steel common sold at the opening at a variance of three points being made in different parts of the crowd. The initial sales totaled 38,000 shares and within 15 minutes there was a gain of 5 1/2 points shown over Tuesday's close. Steel preferred also gained more than 5 points; Lehigh Valley rose 6 points; Union Pacific 3; American Smelting 3 and the entire list showed gains ranging from 2 to 7 points.

Later there were recessions, though the tone remained strong.

As a consequence, 25 election officials, Democrats and Republicans are being held in arrest at the county jail, while waiting to arrange for bail before being committed to their homes. THE DAY OF ATONEMENT

Begins on Sunday Evening And Continues Through Monday.

When the first stars appear in the heavens Sunday evening, October 1st, they will usher in the day holiest to the Jew in his entire religious calendar. From that hour until the evening of the following day, Oct. 2d, the devout Israelite will give himself entirely to God, and to the purifying of his soul by repentance. It will be a day spent by him in meditation and prayer, with no thought of the world; its profits or pleasures. It is the great White Fast, when, abstaining from all food, from sundown to sundown, the people of Israel "afflict their souls" for the sins of the past year.

The holy day is mentioned in the Bible in a number of places; Leviticus xvi describes the elaborate priestly ceremonial of atonement; ibid xxii, 26-28, it appears in the list of festivals where the "affliction of the soul" (fasting) is ordained; ibid xxv, 9 announces that on the Day of Atonement, each fiftieth year, the trumpet sound shall usher in the jubilee year; while Numbers xxix, 7-11 describes the sacrifices of this sacred day. From those references and later accounts in the Talmud we can get a picture of this Day of Awe as it was celebrated in Biblical times. The holy day on the tenth day of Tishri was observed by abstention from food and drink and by an elaborate ceremonial in which the high priest was the central figure. He besought forgiveness for his own sins and those of his own household, then for those of the wider household of priests, then for all the people. Of two goats, he slaughtered one as a sacrifice "for the Lord" and set the other aside "for Azazel." The blood of the sacrifices he sprinkled upon the curtain of the Holy of Holies, to purify it from the sins of the people.

From this Biblical ceremonial which throughout seeks for forgiveness of the community as a whole, the Day of Atonement has been somewhat changed in Rabbinic Judaism and in the modern service and emphasis also repentance and personal prayer for the forgiveness of each individual sinner. It completes the penitential period of ten days that had begun with the New Year's Day.

The celebration of the Day of Atonement begins in the synagogue with the evening service, called Kol Nidre from its opening formula, which refers to vows concerning the individual and his conscience. With its strongly marked melodies and songs, this service assumes in the course of time a very impressive character. Throughout the following day a continuous series of services is held, which toward the middle of the afternoon is heightened in impressive way by a most solemn commemorative service for the dead. This is followed by the Neilah or closing service in which the main stress of the day are especially emphasized; repentance conditioning forgiveness and God's sealing the decree of man for the ensuing year. The service ends with a solemn invocation of God's name, the Shema and the seven fold exclamation, "The Lord, He is God." As a signal of the close of the sacred day, the trumpet (shofar) is blown once, and the devout worshipper turns homeward from God's house with the assurance that in reward for his true and sincere repentance the sins of the past have been forgiven.

Services will be held in the Synagogue Sunday evening at 8 o'clock, and Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The memorial service, the closing service of the day will begin at 8 o'clock. Subject: "Under Sentence of Death."
