QUANTITY OF ARSENIC FOUND IN STOMACH

An Expert Chemist Testifies That He Analyzed the Stomach of Mr. Joseph Whitty and Found A Quantity of Arsenic. Test Tubes And Other Paraphernalia Used in the Test And Still Containing the Deposits of Arsenic Are Placed On Exhibit.

THE PROSECUTION SCORES BIG POINT

Places a Number of Expert Witnesses On the Stand And They Tell Of Examining the Body And What They Discovered. Both Sides Strenuously And Ably Conducting Their Cases.

The third day of the sensational trial of the State vs. Burrill Casey and his wife, Leona Casey, who are being tried for their lives, charged with causing the death of Mr. Joseph Whitty, Leona Casey's former husband, by administering Paris green or some other poison, began yesterday morning at 9:30 o'clock. Although not as crowded as during the first two days of the trial, there were quite a number of spectators present. Casey and his wife were brought in and seated at a table with their attorney. Although they do not seem to be visibly affected by the damning testimony that is being piled up against them, it is noticeable that their demeanor is not as aggressive now as on the first day of the trial.

Mr. John Whitty brother of the deceased, was the first witness placed on the stand by the State. Said he carried the body of the deceased to Pollockville and buried it, that it was not embalmed. That he hired two men to exhume the grave, did not see the body after it was taken out of the grave. When he reached his brother's home on the night he died, the body had been prepared for burial and placed in the coffin. Got a death certificate before he took the body on the train, this stated that the deceased had died of a non-contagious disease.

Dr. Raymond Pollock, the physician who attended Mr. Joseph Whitty in his last illness was next placed on the witness stand. He stated that he was a regular physician and had been practicing for several years. knew Mr. Whitty and was called to attend him a few days before his demise, was lying on the bed fully dressed and seemed to be very sick, prescribed a dose of lactated opium. That this medicine contained no arsenic. On the following Saturday afternoon he again visited Mr. Whitty, noticed something red all over his face, a dead neck, deceased told him that he had been vomiting, examination showed that the patient had a very high fever and his stomach was badly swollen. That Mr. Whitty called for water a number of times and that he wanted to go to the hospital at New Bern. Told his wife that her husband was critically ill and needed daily attention, she told him to call again on the following day, but that morning he received a message stating that Mr. Whitty was dead and he did not go. In making his diagnosis of the case he pronounced it an unusual case of typhoid fever. The next time that he had anything to do with this case he was ordered a few weeks later by Judge Ferguson to exhume Mr. Whitty's body. On May 23, 1911, he and Dr. Gibbs went to Pollockville and took the body out of the grave. The coffin was in a fairly good state of preservation. On opening the coffin they found a man whom he recognized as Mr. Joseph Whitty, removed the cotton from around the face and found that the body was in a good state of preservation. Took the body over to a shady spot and removed several parts of his organic system, after this the body was again placed in the grave. Found a number of peculiar spots on the lining of the stomach which were unusual to the normal stomach. Placed the parts taken from the body in three jars. Tested the preservative placed in the jars and found that it contained no arsenic, then sealed the jars up and carried them to Prof. W. A. Withers at Raleigh, said he was intent when he delivered them. Stated that about a month is usually required for a body to decompose after burial. This body was buried in a dry spot, a hill, bottom of the grave was 8 or 10 feet above the level of the river. Had assisted in exhuming two bodies previous to this. Upon examination found that the parts taken out were in an excellent state of preservation. On his last visit to the deceased he prescribed a dose of lactated opium at intervals and that he had given a very light diet such as soup and other light foods, done this in order that he could reach it on his stomach. patient had frequent spells of vomiting. Did not examine any specimens from the patient's stomach at that time. Upon cross examination he stated that many things contained arsenic, such as wall paper, different kinds of water etc. That upon his visit to the Whitty home previous to the death of Mr. Joseph Whitty, there were several persons in the house. Did not remember whether or not his wife wanted to allow him to go to the hospital.

At this juncture court took a recess until 3:30 o'clock. Upon reconvening Prof. Withers was recalled to the stand and continued his evidence. He further explained the methods used in securing deposits of poisons from human bodies, and stated that he had found 4.6 h of a grain of arsenic in the parts of the system which he examined. Said that arsenic was the principal constituent in Paris green and "rough on rats" contained about 35 per cent of arsenic. Said that a person taking a dose of "Paris green" or "rough on rats" would hardly be able to taste the arsenic in it, and that after death the arsenic would tend to preserve the body. For several hours Prof. Withers was kept on the stand and explained fully the effect of different quantities of arsenic upon the human system and analyzed the ingredients of various grades of arsenic.

The contention of the State and their object in placing expert witnesses on the stand, is to prove conclusively that arsenic was found in the body of the deceased, and that there was a sufficient quantity there to cause death, but this arsenic did not find its way into the body voluntarily, but was intentionally given to the deceased for the purpose of causing his death. They have already placed witnesses on the stand who stated that they saw Paris green around the Whitty home, and that Leona Casey expressed her intention of getting rid of her husband.

The defense contends that if arsenic was found in the body of the deceased that it found its way there through some method, either a part of some medicine given, administered to the deceased in either his food or drink, or administered by one of the parties named.

Three days have already been consumed in the hearing of this case and the amount of testimony will be very large. It is expected that the week will be a very busy one with very

PLENTY LAND FOR SETTLERS

President Makes Eliminations From Forest Reserves to Advise Agriculture.

Washington, Oct. 9.—More than 3,000,000 acres of land formerly included in national forests, has been opened to entry and settlement during the past few months under proclamations of the President eliminating the land from forest reserves because it is believed to be better suited for agriculture than for any other purpose.

These lands will afford homes for many thousands of people. The tracts are widely scattered, so that the preference of almost any homeseeker, can be gratified by the Government. Some of the areas are in Oklahoma and Arkansas, others in New Mexico and Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Washington, Wyoming and Colorado. There are even some in Alaska, which has been "the bone of contention between conservationists and exploiters for several years. By far the largest portion of the areas reopened to entry, however, is in California.

In that State there are good lands to be had in spots all the way between lower California and the Oregon line. Much of it is said to be available for fruit culture. Other areas may be better suited for other crops. The lands can be obtained by complying with the Homestead, and other land laws, the prices being low. Applications should be made to the land offices near the areas opened for entry. All necessary information can be obtained there.

Mr. R. C. White of Greenville Passes.

News received in this city yesterday stated that Mr. R. C. White, of Greenville, N. C., died at a sanatorium in Kingston Saturday night and his remains were laid to rest yesterday afternoon at Greenville.
