DEPUTY MARSHALS ARE DISCHARGED

Started to New Bern With Prisoners, Became Intoxicated and Caused Passengers Much Annoyance.

W. J. Benton, of Whiteville, N. C., and J. L. McLaughlin, of Maxton, N. C., both U. S. Deputy Marshals, were yesterday morning discharged from the Government service for becoming intoxicated while en route to New Bern with prisoners to attend Federal Court.

The Marshals and their prisoners came over from Wilmington Monday evening and passengers on the train reported their bad conduct to the Federal authorities. It is said that they were very offensive, using indecent and vulgar language in the presence of ladies who were on the train and caused all of the passengers much annoyance. As soon as this was heard by the authorities the deputies were called before them and told that their services was no longer required.

McLaughlin has been in the service for more than ten years and has always been well thought of by the Federal authorities and they regret that his indiscretion made it imperative for him to be discharged. Benton also, had a good record up to the time of the present offense. However, acts of this kind cannot be overlooked.

FEDERAL COURT NOW IN SESSION

Convened Yesterday Morning For a Two Weeks Term, Several Cases Disposed of.

Yesterday morning at ten o'clock a two weeks term of the United States Circuit and District Court convened in this city with Judge Henry G. Connor presiding.

At the opening of the session the following list of grand jurors were drawn:

Judge Connor then made his charge to the grand jury. This consumed but a short while, after which the petit jury was secured and the regular routine of business begun.

The following cases were disposed of during the day:

U. S. vs. C. F. Brandt, Jr., of Columbus county, plead guilty to a charge of breaking into the post office at Conly, N. C. Sentence has not yet been passed on the defendant.

U. S. vs. Edward Mills, of Pitt county, illicit distilling, guilty; sentenced to six months on the Pitt county roads.

U. S. vs. John Furlow, of Craven county, charged with retailing. Jury returned a verdict of guilty; sentence has not yet been passed.

TO STOP ALLURING CLAIMS

Of Patent Medicine Curealls, to Enact National Legislation.

Washington, Oct. 24th.—Patent medicine manufacturers who make alluring claims for their cure-alls are to be the subjects of strenuous attacks from now on by Dr. Harvey Wiley, the pure food expert, backed up by the legislative machinery of the House and Senate. President Taft is also a vital factor in the fight, the main feature of which will be to procure the enactment of a new provision to the Pure Food and Drug law that will bring the patent medicine concerns under the watchful eye of Dr. Wiley and his assistants.

The Supreme Court has held that the operation of the Pure Food law do not include the patent medicine men insofar as false or extravagant claims as to the curative powers of their wares is concerned.

"We will get the law through at the coming session of Congress," confidently declared Mr. Wiley. It is understood that President Taft in his message to Congress will renew his demands for an amendment to the law.
