**KING GEORGE'S INDIA TRIP**

Wagers Against His Majesty's Safe Return. Extra Police and Guard Precautions.

London, Nov. 6. Gambling on the life of King George is actually going on in connection with his trip to the Durbar at Delhi. The greatest losses were manifest among British officials in India and communicated here is said to have caused several bets to be made that the King does not return to London alive.

Investigation shows that extraordinary arrangements have been made by Scotland Yard for the King's safety, despite the fact that he will be surrounded by entire regiments of English and native troops almost constantly while in India. Scotland Yard, while chiefly confining its activities to the metropolitan district of London, really stretches its long arms to the utmost confines of the empire, acting as the nation's secret service, and it has taken matters in hand to exercise a more rigid surveillance over. Their Majesties than ever at coronation time, when every suspicious person was summarily hustled from London or arrested.

The reason for the alarmist reports from India is the activity of the Progressive Hindoo party, which is bitterly anti-English, and which has been recently and rapidly enlarged until it includes many members of most of the prominent Indian families. It is reported here that several plots have already been discovered for attempts to harm the King when granting audience to the Indian prince. Consequently even the old medieval customs of examining the food for the royal table and of appointing guards to the bed chamber will be observed throughout the trip, while those in charge candidly admit they will not breathe freely until the ruler is safe back in Buckingham Palace.

In charge of the King's personal escort will be Sir Edward Henry, recently made eugery to His Majesty. Sir Edward's other position is that of commissioner of Scotland Yard, being leader of the 20,000 men comprising that organization. With him will be Superintendent Patrick Quinn, head of the political department of the Bureau of Criminal Investigation, who for weeks has been in touch with Indian affairs through the foreign office.

**BASIS FOR 1911 COTTON CROP**

On Government's Average Figures Previous Crops. Large Holding Back of Cotton.

Greensboro, N. C., Nov. 4. Following is a calculation of the crop this year based on the Government average figures, assuming that so much cotton per acre is produced as was raised in the years mentioned.

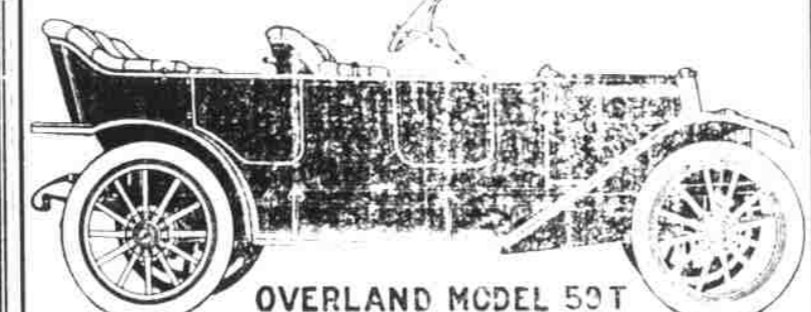

The next census report is to come out on the 8th, inst., showing the amount of cotton in ginn and to November 1st, and the general expectancy is the 1911 crop will be 18,000,000 bales. The "into sight" to date is only 4,629,000 bales which indicates an enormous holding movement.

Everything points to a large production and 14.2 to 15.2 millions is the popular estimate. Even this is more cotton than the spindles of the world can consume and a big surplus must be carried into next crop. Cotton is not without friends and the mills have already bought freely and there has been some investment and speculative buying all the way down from 12c. The war between Italy and Turkey is still going on and the rebellion in China is more serious than the early reports. The tariff on cotton goods is going to be reduced at the next session of Congress and uncettled parties prevail over a large part of the world. Business is a little unsettled and capital is somewhat alarmed.

On the other hand the price is down to practically nine cents and many people are buying simply on the price. Admitting that this argument has much to commend it, nevertheless, there is nothing to be done to cause any big advance in the near future and those who wait before buying may not have to wait so long after buying.

**ACROSS CONTINENT BY AIRSHIP**

Aviator Rodgers Makes Journey New York to Pasadena, Cal., 4,234 Miles.

Pasadena, Cal., Nov. 6. (Fairfax) Rodgers, approaching a successful completion of his ocean-to-ocean jaunt, soared into Pasadena at 4:04 P. M., yesterday on the last spurt of 39 miles from Pomona, and from an altitude of several thousand feet landed at Tournament Park.

Official figures of Rodgers' flight given by his manager show the total distance to have been 4,231 miles and the flying time 4,924 minutes.

Rodgers set out from Sheepshead Bay track, New York, on September 17 at 4:25 o'clock in the afternoon.

Rodgers appeared in the sky line shortly after 3 o'clock. He was sighted first by telescopes from the solar observatory on Mount Wilson and word flashed down the mountains by telephone brought 2,000 persons to Tournament Park. Flying at a height of about 5,000 feet, Rodgers hovered over the city for a few minutes, then circled in a wide spiral and veiled down. His landing was a signal for a rush and Rodgers literally was mobbed. Rodgers started on the last dash of his flight from Banning, Cal., a little town out in the desert, where his arrival had interrupted the only diversion of the year—the funeral dance of the Mojave Indians.

Taking the air at noon, Rodgers ascended gracefully in the face of a twenty mile wind until he had reached an altitude of 400 feet. Then he set his course directly west and sparked his motor up to a thirty mile gait.

The flier arrived over Galtion at 1:37 P. M., with his altitude increased to 1,000 feet, and he kept his height until he neared Pomona. He remained there until after 3 o'clock, renewing his supply of gasoline and refilling the tank of the leaking radiator that brought him near disaster yesterday.

After leaving Pomona, Rodgers kept his line one pointed upward until he had cleared over the highest peaks of the Sierra Madre Mountains. As he sped on to the finish at Tournament Park, he was on a level with the Mount Wilson Observatory and flying close to the rugged sides of the mountain.

His machine, a baby Wright that has only an eighteen foot span of wings, seemed to hesitate for an instant as the aviator carried it into the perilous though spectacular spiral glide. At this time he was directly over the park, but as he came down his flier described every widening curve until he was within a few hundred feet of the ground. Then Rodgers performed one of the ups Arch Hoxsey was taking when he was killed at Dominguez Field within sight of Mount Wilson last December.

Rodgers, in planning the flight, had intended to complete for the W. R. Hearst \$50,000 prize for a coast-to-coast flight. He found out before starting that he would not be able to complete the trip in the time limit stated in the conditions. He had understood that the start of the flight would have to be made by October 10 and the finish within 20 days. Later information gave October 10 as the finishing time limit. Although the aviator recognized that it would be utterly impossible for him to attain his goal under the latter conditions, yet he decided to continue the trip as a personal undertaking in the interests of aviation. Moreover, he had already spent nearly \$25,000 in preparation.
