CONTINUED ANXIETY AT PEKING

Over Coming of General Chang and Army Preparation For Struggle.

Peking, Nov. 10—Two men are on the way to Peking, whose coming is anxiously awaited.

One is Liang Chiehiao, the noted reformer, who is deemed the most influential Chinaman of letters. He is on his way from Japan, where he has long been in exile.

The other is Gen. Chang Shvotsen, commander of the Lanchow troops, who forced from the throne promises of a constitutional government.

Chang refused to go as Imperial Envoy to conciliate the people of the North saying that his troops wanted to remain under his command, but now he is on his way to the capital at the summons of the Government. Thousands of thousands of natives fear that he may not come alone.

In the National Assembly members have asked what measures had been taken to protect Peking against Gen. Chang and whether he is coming at the head of his troops. No member of the Government was present to reply, but the President of the Assembly stated that Chang is accompanied by his soldiers and that palace evidently ordered him here because he stands for the best of the Manchu dynasty can now hope for—a constitutional monarchy.

Chang cannot capture Peking without a struggle, it is thought at the legations. He may be permitted to enter, but a fight is certain before the Manchus will surrender their privileges. The Manchus undoubtedly are preparing for a siege, are storing great quantities of rice in the barracks. The palace's loyal garrison has been increased by small bodies of picked men. A thousand have arrived from Changchun. The Chinese are being outwitted and are being sent outside the walls. The city gates have been overhauled and strengthened.

Prince Regent Chun is incapable of connected thought, it is stated semi-officially, and the nobles cannot agree upon a definite line of action.

Gen. Yin and other high officials and Princes have taken refuge in the legation quarter hotel, while still other Manchus have sought shelter in the various legations.

Sealed boxes of treasure arrive at the legations daily. Ancient works of art appear on the legation walls. These have been given to the members of the legation for safe keeping. Special trains drawn by double engines and packed with passengers are making continuous trips to Tientsin.



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
