ONSLOW TEACHERS MEET.

Held Instructive Monthly Meeting at Jacksonville Saturday.

Jacksonville, N. C., Jan. 9.—The Onslow County Teachers' Association held its December meeting here today. This was the December meeting because the regular time for the December meeting came during the Christmas recess. Saturday's meeting was opened with the singing of "My Faith Looks Up to Thee." Rev. F. A. Liles offered a prayer, after which he talked briefly to the teachers, touching upon home life, the school and the Sunday School as factors in character building, giving special attention to the first part of this subject.

County Superintendent Thompson, in reference to certain local conditions that sometimes arise in the rural localities, exhorted the teachers to try faithfully to settle such difficulties by the use of personal diplomacy so as not to bring about quarrels or disruptions in the school patrons.

Owing to the inclemency of the weather the attendance was not large, and some of the features of the programme were continued until the next meeting of the association to be held on the last Saturday in January.

A round table discussion on various subjects was indulged in by many of the teachers present. This discussion dealt largely with the text books and the requirements of teaching them. Generally the teachers seem well pleased with the newly adopted list of books.

ALLEGED "TIGER" IN THE TOILS

Young Boy Hungry and Cold Has Negro Arrested Who Sold His Father Whiskey.

Shivering with cold and weak from hunger Edward Cavanaugh, the young son of D. R. Cavanaugh, who lives near the city, called at Mayor McCarthy's home Monday night and told him that he wanted a warrant for Nick Ferran, colored, for selling whiskey to his father a few hours previous. After questioning the lad the Mayor was convinced that he was telling the truth, and an officer was sent to Ferran's home. Upon arriving there a search was made and a number of empty bottles and jugs were found and also one bottle of whiskey. There was plenty of evidence that whiskey had been sold there and Ferran was placed under arrest.

The defendant was given a preliminary hearing yesterday afternoon, and probable cause being found was bound over to the next term of superior court under a bond of \$100 which he secured and was released from custody.

Young Cavanaugh related a story to the court that was pitiful in every detail. He said that instead of his father taking the little money that he had and expending it to buy food and clothing for his family, that he bought whiskey with it, and that if he could possibly do so he intended reporting every man who sold whiskey to his father in the future. In this way he hopes to make it impossible for him to secure any liquor, and it is quite probable that he will be successful.

MEETING NOT A LOVE FEAST

The Lie is Passed at Meeting of Democratic National Committee.

Washington, Jan. 9th.—William J. Bryan has made his fight in the Democratic National Committee and lost. He made Colonel James M. Guffy, member of the committee from Pennsylvania, the issue, and the committee declined to unseat Col. Guffy by a vote of 30 to 18. Mr. Bryan at once appealed from a decision of Chairman Mack and was defeated by a vote of 33 to 13.

The committee session was marked by extreme bitterness of feeling. Once the lie was passed and blows seemed imminent. Mr. Bryan, from first to last, was the central figure in the proceedings, and the fight he precipitated lasted throughout the day.

So much time was devoted to the contested seats in the committee that the more important matter of choosing a convention city, fixing the time of the gathering and adopting a form of call to include the "pejorative primary" plan of selecting delegates, went over until tomorrow.

Baltimore stood out tonight as the favorite of all her competitors. The representatives of that city proudly displayed a certified check for \$100,000 as their bid for the convention. St. Louis seemed to hold second place, with Denver and Chicago under consideration, and New York far behind.
