AN INCREASE OF BANKERS' TRUST

By Another Merger. Which Tight Strikes New Bern. -Yeslerday's Mileage Does North Caroling. ens J. P. Morgan's Money Hold.

New York, Feb. 22d - The influence of J. P. Morgan & Co. over the figancial institutions of New York was further extended by the conclusion of negotistions for the merger of the Bank ers' Trust Co. and the Manhattan Tru-t Co. The combined institutions will form, with a single exception, the most powerful trust company in the United States. The exception, the Guaranty Trust Co, was acquired by Mr. Morgan at the close of 1909 by the purchase of stock holdings of the Mutual Life Insurance Co. and the Harriman estate. The terms of the deal were announced in the following offic al statement issued by the Manhattan Trust Co.

Negotiations, which were considered at the time of the sale of this company's property at the corner of Walland Nassau streets to the Barkers' Trust Company two years ago, have now been renewed and successfully concluded, and will shortly result in a merger of this company into the Bankers' Trust Co. By the terms of the proposed merger plan the Bankers' Trust Company will increase its capital stock from \$5,-000,000 to \$15,000. Of the new stock \$4,000,000 will be sold to its present stockholders and \$1,000,000 will be exchanged for \$1,000,000 outstanding capital stock of this company. The two sets of officers in the new Bankers' Trust Company building will now be thrown into one, and in fact, the proximity of these offices has been the leading factor in bringing about the mer-

The Bankers' Trust Company has a present capital of \$5,000,000, a surplus of \$13 518,400; total deposits, \$137,493,-100, and cash, \$14,831,300. The Manhattan has a capital of \$1,000,000; sur plus of \$2,252,100; total deposits, \$21,combined resources of the two compa nies will be \$182.330,600. The total resources of the Guaranty Trust Company are \$208,793,600, though its capital stock is only \$5,000,000,

The Bankers' Trust Company was crganized in 1903 through the efforts of Henry P. Davison, now a member of J. P. Morgan & Co. Three members of this firm are members of the Board of Directors, which includes twentyseven bank officials, among them representatives of Chicago, Philadelphia and Kansas City banking concerns.

The gavel to be used by the Southern Commercial Congress in Nashville, April 8 to 10, is being prepared by The Ladies Hermitage Association, It will be made of hickory from a tree planted by "Old Hickory," Andrew Jackson, when he erected the tomb to his wife, in Nashville. The Nathville meeting of the Congress comes just one hundred years after the ou break of the war of 1812, in which "Old Hickory" took such avalint part, and just fifty years af er the battle of Shiloh, in Tenhessee. During cach of the years 1911 to 1915, special gavels will be used by be Southern Commercial Congress, as its meetings are intended to emphasize the contrast between conditions of today and conditions of earlier days.

According to Logan Waller Page, Director of the office of Public Roads, there are 2,199,645 miles of public roads in the United States.
