REVENUE RECEIPTS NOT FALLING OFF

Former Raleigh Boy Announced As Candidate For Governor of Florida.

Raleigh, N. C., April 3.—The revenue receipts for this district for the month of March are announced as \$356,746.33, a slight falling from February and still less than January. Nevertheless, the closing quarter will show a big collection. The government has received \$1,185,311.13. Of this January furnished \$409,196.90 and February \$369,372.90. This is maintaining the record well and there is no falling off. It is made all the more notable because there is little if any whiskey revenue in this collection. All that may have crept into it comes from other places, if it is there. The department doesn't get a cent from any distillery, though there are some Federal licenses in existence, it is well known, and not a few tigers in Raleigh have availed themselves of the privilege of owning one. Thus far, there does not appear to be any falling off in the tobacco revenues as the result of the recent disposition of the American Tobacco Company, and Durham will furnish apparently as much as ever. The dissolved companies declare that so far as they are concerned, there will be no decrease in the manufacture of tobacco. The Florida papers have announced the candidacy of Hon. John W. Watson, for Governor of Florida, a political item that will be of great interest to Raleigh people where Mr. Watson was born and spent his early manhood. Mr. Watson is remembered as the son of a well known photographer of the city who died many years ago. The family remained here some years afterwards but broke up, Mrs. Walter L. Tucker having been one of the daughters. Of the five girls and two boys, there are now four living, both men surviving. Mrs. Tucker was a sister of Mr. Watson.

Adjutant Leinster has received from the war department the names of the regular army officers who have been detailed for duty as instructors at the officers' camp of instruction to be held here May 13-18. They are Maj. J. Farrisworth, Capt. A. J. Dougherty, Captain Jenks and Lieutenants Marshall and Goodwyn. Major Henry Pace, M. D., of Fort Moultrie, is expected to instruct the officers of the medical corps.

Mr. Chas. V. Brown, state bank examiner has filed his resignation with the Corporation Commission to become effective May 1. Mr. Brown will accept the position of cashier of the Bank of Lumberton. Mr. Samuel A. Hubbard of Reidsville, is assistant bank examiner. Mr. Brown was promoted from assistant to the office of examiner on his resignation last September of Mr. J. Kemp Doughton.

Mr. Leonard H. Royster, one of the oldest and best known citizens of Raleigh, died Tuesday morning at his home on the corner of Salisbury and Johnson streets, after an illness of three months. He was 71 years old. He is survived by his wife, who was Miss Bettie A. Frost, and two brothers and one sister—Mr. D. W. Royster, of Winston-Salem, who came to be with him during his illness; Mr. W. B. Royster and Mrs. Susan A. Haynis of Raleigh. Mr. Royster was born in Raleigh 71 years ago.

DOINGS AT THE NATION'S CAPITAL

Taft Will Reply to the Colonel's Attack But Not Now. Four New Members Does Not Change Political Complexion of Senate.

Washington, D. C., April 31.—President Taft will continue to refrain from reply to Colonel Roosevelt's attack on him and his administration. The president intends answering some of the charges the former president has made in the last few days, but there will be nothing personal in the answers. The first three replies will be made on April 11th at New York when the president attends the annual reception of the U. S. League Club and the annual dinner of the class of '78 of Yale, the president's class. At this time the president expects to take up the charge against his railroad legislation, including the establishment of the Commerce Court. He will not mention Roosevelt's name.

The Anti-Trust laws of Missouri were upheld today unanimously by the Supreme Court of the United States. The court approved of the state's action in ousting the Standard Oil Company of Indiana and the Republic Oil Company of New York from the state and fining each \$50,000 under these laws.

The state charged the companies with having entered into a combination to control the prices of oils and to prevent competition within the state. The Supreme Court of Missouri found them guilty.

Although within 24 hours Mexico and the United States have shown each other the mailed fist, officials in the State Department declared that the outlook today is much more favorable for peace than is due to the enthusiasm with which Madero's message to the Mexican Congress was received and the announcement that the Mexican president has good hopes of levying a new army of 60,000 men to crush the rebellion. Should recruits flock to Madero's army it would put an end to all talk of intervention, according to State Department officials.

Americans in Mexico are safe as long as Madero holds supremacy. It Mexicans support their administration Orzoquieta and the Tarrasos Ciel de la Barranca, believed to be financing him, face disaster.

Cesar Cone, of Greensboro, went before the Senate committee on agriculture and protested against the passage of the Smith anti-option bill which if passed, would prevent the buying or selling of "futures" of all agricultural products. Mr. Cone said the bill could do no good to any one, could but result in a great loss to the cotton growers and manufacturers.

Senator Overman has received a letter from the Secretary of Agriculture announcing the appointment of Mr. Cameron F. McRae, of Wilmington, as examiner of title for the Appalachian Park Commission. Mr. McRae stood the civil service examination a short time ago. He is the third examiner appointed.

Should governor Hooper appoint Newell Sanders, a Republican, to fill on Senator "Hob" Taylor's unexpired term, Sanders will be the first Republican Senator from the former Confederate States since Senator Pritchard of North Carolina.
