NORFOLK-SOUTHERN TRAIN IS WRECKED

Wrecked. Number of Persons Injured. Rear Truck Jumps The Track.

Norfolk, Va., May 13th.—Norfolk Southern train No. 2, known as the "New Bern Flyer," was wrecked half a mile south of Hickory Ground Sunday afternoon while en route to Norfolk. 19 were slightly hurt.

The wreck was caused by the rear truck on the mail coach leaving the rails, causing the rear coaches to turn over. The track was torn up for 100 yards. The accident occurred at 3:18 o'clock while the train was en route to Norfolk.

The following statement was issued by officials of the Norfolk-Southern: "Train No. 2, engine 127, consisting of mail car, two coaches and parlor car due to leave New Bern at 9:25 a. m., due to arrive at Norfolk 3:35 p. m., in charge of conductor Ferebee, engineer Fields, two coaches and a parlor car derailed and turned over, the coaches turned completely over on side, parlor car partly over, rear truck of mail car derailed about half mile south of Hickory Ground. Accident occurred at 3:18 p. m., train due to leave Elizabeth City 2:14 p. m. was on time, schedule call for about 32 miles per hour. The exact cause of the accident at this time not definitely determined, supposition some defect developed with forward truck of leading coach, No. 247, as it was known to be first to leave the track. No one seriously injured."

The injured were brought to this city on a special train and sent to St. Vincent's hospital. Most of them were discharged tonight and all of them will leave the institution tomorrow it was stated.

Of Hundreds Americans Every Year. Some Action To Be Taken.

Washington, May 11—"A greater number of Americans perish from eating diseased meat than from any other cause."

Mrs. C. B. Crane made this statement to the House committee on expenditures in the Agricultural Department today, while advocating the adoption of the Nelson resolution to investigate the meat inspection service.

Mrs. Crane, replying to a recent circular of the Department of Agriculture which described her as being "in the pay" of some one, said that as an expert in hygiene and sanitation she had been employed by an Ohio manufacturing concern at the personal solicitation of its owner, but that employment, she said, was entirely foreign to her present mission.

SEND MAIL BY AIRSHIP

Postmaster Ordered to Send 100 Pounds by the Biplane Service to the Capital.

Washington, May 11—Postmaster General Hitchcock authorized the Postmaster at New York to dispatch mail to Washington on May 22 by aeroplane on request of a Washington aeroplane company. The Postmaster General hopes that ultimately the regular transportation of mail by aeroplane may be practicable.

Such a service, he suggests, if found feasible might be established in many districts, especially in the West, where the natural conditions restrict other methods of rapid transportation.

In the experiment between New York and Washington an effort will be made to carry at least one hundred pounds of mail without stop. Under the order of the Postmaster-General the aviator must be sworn in as a mail carrier and the transportation must be without expense to the Government. The machine will fly a pennant bearing the inscription, "United States Mail."
