## HARMON HAS LARGE MAJORITY

Ohio Governor Gets Practically a Solid Delegation In His State.

Columbus, Ohio, May 23.—According to returns in hand from approximately 4,500 of the 5,912 precincts in the State, Colonel Theodore Roosevelt's delegates to the National Republican Convention carried Tuesday's Ohio primary by a plurality of about 25,000 votes. It now seems scarcely possible that final results from the primary pool will change the number of district delegates for either side by more than one or two. The best figures available tonight show that Roosevelt has 32 of the 42 district delegates selected yesterday and that President Taft has ten.

Although later returns on the Democratic Presidential preference primary vote gave Woodrow Wilson a fighting chance for one or two more delegates, the New Jersey man's exact standing will not be known for several days when certain belated rural returns have been secured from dilatory judges who refused to complete the counts in their precincts before taking a night's sleep. However, Governor Harmon practically is assured a complete delegation of 48 delegates to the Baltimore convention. His lead now gives him control of the State Democratic Convention, which will select six delegates at large. Also it is said that the convention will provide for the unit rule which will force the Wilson delegates, selected by districts yesterday to vote for the Ohio executive.

## Looks For Big Fruit Crop In North Carolina.

Raleigh, N. C., May 23.—State Horticulturist W. M. Hunt says the extreme limit for late frosts that might injure the fruit crop in this State having past, he feels absolutely safe in forecasting a record yield of all varieties this season in all parts of the State. There has not been reported, he says, a single untoward that might give any variety of fruit a set back in yield. He thinks now that the growers need only to have an eye to judicious thinning of the fruit to prevent injury to the trees and give opportunity for the best development.

## ALLEGED TIGRESS IN THE TOILS

## CLAIMS ARE CUT DOWN

Senate Refused to Agree on House Omnibus Bill.

Washington, May 23.—Of the 25 North Carolina claims in the Omnibus bill as it passed the House only nine remain in the bill as it was reported today by the Senate committee on claims. The House proposed to pay an enormous number of claims approved by the court which grew out of damages to private property through its use or destruction by Union soldiers during the Civil War.

The nine remaining claims in the bill are Bushrod W. Nash, trustee of the Union Baptist Church, successor in interest of the Hood Swamp Baptist church of Wayne county, \$500; trustee of the Presbyterian church of Lenoir Bridge, \$1,500; trustee of the Methodist Episcopal church, South, Birmingham City, \$200; trustee of the District of East Carolina of the Protestant Episcopal Church at Nag's Head, \$250; trustee of South Primitive Baptist church of Johnston county, \$200; trustee of the Primitive Baptist Church of Newport, \$200; trustee of the Catholic church of Washington, \$2,000; trustee of the Methodist Church, South of Washington, \$200; trustee of the Presbyterian church of Washington, \$2,000.

## UPRISING IN CUBA SERIOUS

Is More Alarming Than at First Supposed. United States May Send Warships.

Santiago, May 23d.—The negro uprising is increasingly serious. Over five thousand negroes have taken up arms in Oriente province. Floyd Shick and Joseph Bryan, American citizens, complained to American Consul Holladay, at Santiago that they were assaulted and robbed on the way to Siboney by a band of armed negroes.

Washington, D. C., May 23d.—State department advices today state that the Cuban revolutionary movement is more alarming and wide spread than at first supposed. The negroes are well armed. The leaders are threatening foreign property. Conflicts between rural guards and negro bands resulted in casualties to the guard. The number of revolutionists is officially estimated at 1,500. The Cuban government is hurrying troops to the affected zones.

Washington, D. C., May 23d.—The state department is considering sending a warship to Cuban waters, because of the negro uprising, to supplement the small naval force there now, embodied in the little gunboat Paducah and the survey boat Eagle. The gunboat Nashville is at Santo Domingo, and the cruiser Montgomery at Pensacola, within two days run of Guantanamo, the center of the insurrection. Strengthening the American Naval force there would prevent any move toward reckless destruction of foreign property.

## Former New Bern Men Gets New Trial.

The following news item will be of interest to many of our readers. Mr. Seward resided here for a few years and was in the employ of Messrs. E. H. & J. A. Meadows.

Raleigh, May 23.—In a batch of 11 opinions handed down by the Supreme Court this evening are two of more than usual interest. One of these is that of R. H. Seward, appellant, against the Seaboard Air Line, from Wake. Seward was discharged by the defendant road after a series of accidents, and the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, to whom he appealed, declined to intercede for him. He made application to three other railroads for employment and these reads asked for his record, he referring them to the Seaboard. The records were furnished, but one of the employees of the road, in writing the record, added, "and will state further that this man is now suing the Seaboard Air Line for personal injury." The Superior court judge, after the testimony had been presented, ordered a nonsuit and the plaintiff appealed. The Supreme court held that the statement of this informant was malicious, as it was not a part of the man's record as engineer. In a dissenting opinion, Judge Brown took the position that an employer who is reckless and careless has no business driving an engine where lives are at stake. The court ordered a new trial.

## Jury Gives Finding Verdict For \$10,000.

Raleigh, N. C., May 23.—A Wake County Superior Court jury has returned a verdict for \$10,000 damages for the plaintiff in the case of George B. Fleming vs. Norfolk Southern Railroad.

Fleming sued for personal injuries sustained in a wreck at August, 1910, within the Raleigh yard limits. He was an engineer on an incoming passenger train that collided with a yard engine, the engineer in which was attempting to get out on a siding without orders. The latter was killed.

The railroad company claims that Fleming was running the passenger train too fast, and the wreck would not have occurred in spite of the recklessness of the yard engineer.
