TEXAS RANGERS HAD NERVE

Two of Them Threaten to Arrest the Whole Mexican Rebel Army.

Fabens, Tex., May 24th.—Details received yesterday show that the cool judgment of the United States army lieutenant and the aggressive stand of two Texas rangers in the face of 200 Mexican rebels advancing on the American boundary line probably prevented serious complications when troop B, fourth United States cavalry, the band of liberal soldiers across the border here Wednesday.

"Death to them," cried the Mexicans as they charged forward to a wagon road where Lieutenant C. A. Daugherty and 35 men of troop B had stationed themselves, their rifles pointed toward Mexico. C. E. Webster and Charles Moore, of the Texas rangers, who have been accompanying the American troops in their border patrol spurred forward.

"If you dare come across this wagon road we'll arrest your whole army. This road is the boundary line," shouted Webster in Spanish to the advancing rebels, who formed into a fighting line. Webster demanded at the same time that the rebels send out their chiefs for parley. Colonels Jose Cordova and Charles Bustamante, in command of the rebels, who were moving on Guadalupe, dismounted and came forward.

NATIONAL EXPOSITION

To Be Held in Knoxville, Tenn., September and October, 1913 Will Be of Great Interest to the Whole United States—Exposition Resolutions.

Washington, D. C., May 24.—An exposition of national scope, the purpose of which is to promote the conservation of our natural resources, is to be held in Knoxville, Tennessee in September and October, 1913. It is to be known as the National Conservation Exposition, and while it is to be open to all parts of the country, its special field will be the development of the Southern states. An advisory board of leaders in the various branches of conservation work, with Gifford Pinchot at its head, has been formed as part of the exposition company's organization, and is now at work formulating detailed plans for the exhibits. Each department of conservation is represented on this board by one or more experts in that field.

The conservation exposition is an outgrowth of the Appalachian Exposition, which has been held at Knoxville for the past two years. During that time an exposition plant and equipment has been built up which will serve as a valuable nucleus around which the national fair is to be built. This plant comprises a park of one hundred acres, in which are two artificial lakes and several excellent buildings. This and all other property of the Appalachian Exposition Company has been taken over by the National Conservation Exposition Company, which has made application for a charter providing for a capital stock of one million dollars.

Respectable attorneys, the Governor says, represented to him that they have good grounds for executive clemency, and that a reprieve was necessary for them to have time to submit their grounds. The reprieve is granted till June 7th.

UNDERWOOD IS GRATIFIED

Over the Result of the Virginia Primary. Wilson Delegates Throw Him Down.

Special to Journal. Washington, D. C., May 24.—The Washington Herald today carries the following special from Norfolk, Va.: Woodrow Wilson while apparently the choice of the delegates of the Virginia Democratic convention was beaten tooth and nail tonight by his own delegate, who accepted the terms of a resolution adopted by an overwhelming vote which practically places the control of the twenty-four votes from Virginia in the hands of sixteen delegates who are opposed to the New Jersey governor.

The Wilson delegates seeing it was hopeless to secure an instructed delegation, accepted an amendment which gave the New Jersey man eight instructed delegates, but who after first ballot at the national convention will be bound to the unit rule if the remaining two thirds sixteen delegates decide to cast the entire Virginia vote for some other candidate. Sixteen of the twenty-four delegates elected are opposed to Woodrow Wilson first last and a time. These sixteen delegates will control the entire Virginia delegation after the first ballot at Baltimore, Wilson can get more than eight of the twenty four votes and after the first ballot, if he fails to receive the nomination the entire Virginia delegation will be lost to him.

Underwood headquarters in Washington is high gratified over the success of Mr. Underwood in Virginia he has won his seventh victory in succession. With the exception of Alabama, his home state, he has contested with Gov. Wilson in six states, three of which Florida, Georgia and Mississippi, declared outright for Mr. Underwood, and in three, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia, although they had been making a long and persistent fight. The Wilson forces were unsuccessful in securing instructions. Mr. Underwood has not acted sore in a single state of his campaign. His next victory will be in the state of North Carolina where it is expected he will secure an instructed delegation at the State convention which meets in Raleigh on June 6th. He has made a clean and high class campaign in North Carolina and has avoided personalities and appeals to prejudices. His friends have relied solely upon the strength of his own candidacy, and not upon the weakness of his principal opponent he has been without the powerful influence of the leading Democratic organ of the state and he has had aligned against him the entire strength of the chairman of the State Democratic committee, and of the national committeemen from North Carolina. They have never failed to seize an opportunity to discredit Mr. Underwood and his campaign. Despite these conditions Mr. Underwood has steadily grown and his friends throughout the North Carolina believe that he was successful in carrying the State in the primaries on the 18th instant. They feel certain that he will secure from the several county conventions on May 25th, delegations to the congressional conventions and to the State convention. It is further believed that Underwood delegates will be chosen by the congressional convention and that the four delegates from the state at large are certain to be Underwood men. Although contesting with Governor Harmon in Ohio Governor Wilson was disastrously defeated and he will not receive a single vote from that State in the Baltimore convention.

Troops Have Been Sent. Washington, May 24.—As a result of reports of danger to American lives and property in Cuba, the Navy Department at the request of the State Department, has ordered the naval transport Prairie to embark 500 marines at Philadelphia, and proceed immediately to the United States naval station at Guantanamo to join the guntboats Paducah and Nashville.

Haveva, May 24.—A report has reached here that General Henriquez Estrella and General Innes, leaders of the insurgent negroes, have sent emissaries to the camp of the commander of the government troops near Guantanamo to treat for terms of peace.

The Cuban government is confident that it has the situation fully in hand and is determined not to accept anything less than an immediate and unconditional surrender.

In default of the immediate submission of the insurgents a series of government troops will proceed to attack the rebels from all sides.
