**HEYBURN BLOCKS WORK OF SENATE**

Senators of Both Parties Make Plans For Early Adjournment.

Washington, May 27.—Senate Democrats, Republicans and Progressives, today joined in a discussion regarding the quick disposition of pending legislation. The net result was a brighter prospect for early passage of the metal and other tariff bills, which may pave the way for an adjournment earlier than anticipated.

Senator Simmons unsuccessfully proposed earlier sessions or night sessions for the consideration of the tariff measures. For a time, there was a prospect of beginning voting on amendments to the metal bill, but Senator Heyburn of Idaho, who is trying to block tariff revision, held the floor with a speech until a quorum of Senators appeared and the Senate had to adjourn.

Senators, Lodge, Stone and Hitchcock announced willingness to forego making tariff speeches which they have prepared, in the interest of quick action and speedy adjournment. Senator Heyburn is the only senator who is not disposed now to proceed to vote on the bill. Senator Cummins will speak on his amendment, but will not attempt to postpone action.

Plans of Republican Senators to abstain themselves when the voting stage is reached on the steel tariff bill practically were completed today insuring passage of the Democratic House measure. This, Republican senators say, will give the President an opportunity to veto a straight Democratic proposition. The same plan may be carried out with the other tariff bills.

Senator Heyburn declared that final adjournment would be impossible before Nov. 1, when it would be desirable for senators to go home to vote he said.

**VANCEBORO MAN IN THE TOILS**

Placed Under Arrest by Revenue Officer While Escorting Young Lady Home.

Major Willis, a young white man from Vanceboro section was brought before U. S. Commissioner Hill, by U. S. deputy marshal Lilly, arrested under a presentment and bill found at the last term of Federal Court held in this city. The defendant gave bond yesterday as required by the Commissioner, in the sum of \$500 for his appearance at the October term of said court, to answer the charge of violating the Internal Revenue laws. Bills of indictment found on presentment before grand jurors sometime work great hardships on innocent defendants. This young man of course knew nothing about a bill having been found against him, or he could have come to the city with his bondsmen and given bond required with ease and without the seeming unnecessary imprisonment he had to suffer.

He was on his way to this city, accompanying his two sisters and some other ladies, and was arrested on the afternoon train last Saturday, taken away from the ladies he was protecting on a hurried trip to this city, they intending to return home on the night train, and was committed to jail till he could communicate with friends who came to his assistance today.

The young man owns a house and farm of 25 acres of land, but was informed that the U. S. law did not provide for mortgaging it to secure his appearance as does the State law. There may be no way to avert such hardships upon people accused of offenses against the U. S. Government, but there certainly ought to be.

**NEW BUTTER TEST FOR SALT AND FAT**

Government Dairy Expert Develops New Apparatus For Creameries.

Washington, D. C., May 27.—Secretary Wilson, of the department of agriculture, calls attention to a new test for fat and salt in butter which is described in circular No. 202, bureau of animal industry, just issued by the department.

This test was invented by Rescoe H. Shaw, chemist in the dairy division, and is especially designed for use in creameries. The circular explains the apparatus in detail and gives complete instructions for operating the test, placing in the hands of practical creamerymen a simple, rapid and accurate method by which can be determined the percentage of fat and salt in butter, and which in connection with one of the reliable moisture tests already in use, make possible the complete analysis of butter right before the churn.

The new test for fat will probably not require more than five dollars' worth of apparatus beside that already on hand in most creameries. The same centrifuge is used as in the Babcock test and the same acid.

The special apparatus consists of a separatory funnel of glass with a capillary stem. The separatory funnel is essentially a cylinder holding about two and a half ounces constructed with a glass stopper at the top and a stopcock in a capillary tube at the bottom. A special socket is necessary to hold the funnel while in the centrifuge.

The principal steps involved in the test are: The washing out of the salt from a weighed charge of the butter with hot water, the dissolving out of the curd with hot dilute sulphuric acid, the separation of the acid solution from the fat and the weighing of the fat. When the salt test is to be made, the wash water is collected and the salt in it is determined by the usual chemical reaction.

The time consumed in making the correct is not much if any more than is required to make a careful test for factory cream by the Babcock method. A little more time is required if the percentage of salt is wanted.

The new test has been thoroughly tried out in comparison with the official laboratory methods and is quite in accord with them in results.

**To Be Record Business Year.**

Washington, May 27.—A new high record for foreign commerce will be established by the United States in the fiscal year 1912, ending with next month.

Growth has been especially marked in the export trade, but imports also show a substantial increase. Figures for 10 months to the close of April, made public today by the Commerce and Labor Department's bureau of statistics, indicate that exports for the year will approximate in value \$2,200,000,000, exceeding by \$100,000,000 the previous high record made in 1911, while the import total of about \$1,600,000,000 will top that of 1910, the previous record year, by more than \$40,000,000.

**Fourth Naval Division Leaves New York For Key West.**

Washington, May 27.—Capt. George E. Clark, commanding the Minnesota, commands the fourth naval division which left New York Sunday for Key West, Admiral Underhill being in the hospital.

The vessels will arrive at their destination some time Wednesday.

The battleship Nebraska, en route from New Orleans to Hampton Roads, was spoken by radio in the Gulf of Mexico and instructed to stop at Key West and join her division, the third, when it arrives.

The Georgia, New Jersey and Rhode Island, which with the Nebraska form the third division, steamed hurriedly into Hampton Roads at 5 o'clock Sunday.
