## METAL TARIFF BILL AMENDED

Senate Devotes Day to Consideration of Amendments and Adjourns Without Reaching a Vote.

Washington, May 30.—After devoting yesterday largely to the consideration of amendments to the iron and steel bill, the senate adjourned last night without reaching a final vote on that measure. Senator Heyburn held the floor upon adjournment, and the understanding is that when he concludes a vote will be taken.

The amendments adopted place a long list of farm implements on the free list, repeal the Canadian reciprocity law and provide for a duty of \$2.00 per ton on pig iron to 6 per cent, and that on ferro-silicon to 10 per cent. There was prolonged and sharp controversy over an amendment by Senator Pomerene, of Ohio, to tax machine tools from the free list, as the House provided and fix a duty of 20 per cent on them. This was defeated by a vote of 18 to 43.

The successful unexpected fight for the repeal of the reciprocity law was inaugurated by Senator Gronna, who at first proposed the repeal of all the reciprocity law, except the second section which permits the free admission of print paper from Canada.

Senator Gallinger moved as an amendment the repeal of the entire reciprocity law, including the paper provision. This suggestion was accepted by Mr. Gronna, who withdrew his own amendment in its favor. The effect of the success of the Gallinger amendment would have been to restore the Payne-Aldrich rate of \$3.75 per ton on print paper and Senator Cummins declared it is unwillingness to go so far. He then proposed a rate of \$2 per ton on print paper, which Mr. Gallinger accepted. The vote on this amendment stood 37 to 27.

Senator Cummins stated positively that if it should become a law the provision would have the effect of placing a duty of \$2 per ton on paper from all other countries, as well as on that from Canada.

An amendment by Senator Hitchcock, of Nebraska, reducing the duty on pig iron to 6 cents, in place of 8 cents as fixed by the House, was voted in 36 to 20, while an amendment by Senator Watson, of West Va., fixing the duty on ferro-silicon at 10 per cent instead of 15 per cent was adopted without a division.

## CUBAN TROUBLE BECOMING WORSE

Fearing That Flame of Insurrection May Burst Out in Other Provinces Besides Oriente.

Washington, May 30.—Doubt is expressed here that the Cuban government will have 9,000 troops and volunteers in Oriente province within the next few days. The report that the government would muster that number is believed to have been confused with the fact that President Gomez has issued a large number of rifles to law-abiding citizens to protect their property against attacks from rebel bands.

It is admitted here that the movement is becoming worse in Oriente, with the probability that the flame of insurrection may burst out again in other provinces, where the disturbances are believed to have been quelled. It is declared at the State Department that there is now no intention of increasing the American naval force in Cuban waters.

If it becomes necessary to send more of the vessels now at Key West to Cuban ports, such an intention of this government will not be communicated to President Gomez. The notification that the United States intended to send the second squadron at Key West as a precautionary measure for the protection of American and foreign interests in Cuba, should that government be unable to do so, is deemed sufficient.

The gunboat Nashville, in command of Commander Casey B. Morgan, arrived at Nipe Bay from Guantanamo Wednesday. The vessel was dispatched there to investigate conditions reported to be serious. Many large American interests are located in the vicinity.

## Olves Women Bath of Tar.

Ocean City, Md., May 30.—Increased because a woman who had been searred by the local authorities several months by the local authorities several months ago to leave the town for the good of public morals persisted in making her abode here, a mob, said by the woman herself to have consisted of about 50 persons, and which others estimate at perhaps half that number, broke into the house, took her from her bed, marched her about a quarter of a mile to the sidewalk where fishermen have their camp, and dipped her several times in the pot used for tanning the nets. After each dipping the woman would be taken out and stood on the draining board, and when in the opinion of the mob she had been sufficiently punished, she was allowed to go. The tar pot is about three feet deep, and the tanning was therefore most thorough. It is also alleged that on the way to the scene of the dip ping the victim was kicked and otherwise brutally treated, but this report cannot be substantiated.
