CONGRESS PRESENTS CHARGES

Of Judge B. W. Archbald. Senator Simmons Urges Prompt Action.

Washington, July 9.—A sharp difference along political lines has developed in the senate over the proposed impeachment of Judge Robert W. Archbald, of the Commerce court. Many senators, including influential Republicans, favor deferring the trial until after the November election, contending that ample time should be given to prepare for the hearing of the impeachment charges and that many senators are needed at home to look after their political losses.

Other senators, among whom are Senators Simmons, Bailey and Reed, all Democrats urge that impeachment proceedings are of such high privilege that they should be taken up as soon as the house shall prefer the charges, irrespective of the personal comfort and convenience of senators.

The thirteen articles of impeachment, each an accusation, were presented to the house today with the announcement that their consideration tomorrow would be demanded. Speaker Clark emphasized the solemnity of the proceeding by securing the undivided attention of the house while the articles were being read by representative Clayton, of Alabama, chairman of the judiciary committee which unanimously reported them. Mr. Clayton dwelt on the gravity of the charges. The committee's report and resolution calling for the impeachment were ordered printed and distributed to members without the voicing of a single objection.

SEAMEN STRIKERS MAKE RIOT

New York Police Kept Busy And One Finally Forced to Use Gun.

New York, July 9.—Serious disorders in connection with the seamen's strike broke out last night. A man believed to be a striker was killed, a Brooklyn policeman probably fatally shot, another policeman seriously injured and a strike breaker probably fatally wounded.

One disorder occurred in New York on the lower East River front when the police tried to disperse a crowd of 500 strikers and sympathizers. Many shots were fired, mainly as a show of defiance, and missiles of all kinds were thrown.

When reserves dispersed the mob, a man with a bullet wound through his head was picked up. He died on the operating table at the hospital.

The police declare that one of the strikers fired the bullet. Twenty men were arrested.

In Brooklyn Alexander Sevano, a striking fireman, shot Ancienta Gonzalez, a strike breaker. Gonzalez will probably die.

Policeman Patrick Hanley, who gave chase when he saw the shooting, was shot by the fleeing assailant. A bullet pierced his lungs and at the hospital it is said that he will probably die. John Williams, another policeman, was shot through the right thigh and the left leg.

Washington, July 9.—By unanimous action the International Bible Students' Association adopted a resolution unreservedly repudiating as thoroughly unscriptural the teaching of a plave, state or condition, of "hell fire and brimstone" for the torment of the wicked. Four thousand delegates in the convention resolved that the vast majority of ministers of all protestant denominations in the United States, had practically repudiated the "hell fire" theory. It was the sense of the convention that because of the failure of ministers to fully inform their congregation of their belief on this theory, that tens of thousands were being driven into skepticism and infidelity.

Richmond, Va., July 9.—Attorney for Virginia Christian, the young Elizabeth county colored girl under sentence of death for the murder of Mrs. Ida Belote on March 18, has filed a petition for executive clemency with Governor Mann. The plea rehearses the story of the crime, makes a denial of guilt, but denies that the murder was premeditated.

Among the other things, the petition sets forth that the trial was held shortly after the crime, when the community was still agitated with the brutal details of the killing, and that the girl, who is only seventeen years old, was defended by two colored lawyers, upon whose earnest solicitation she waived the right to call the jury her version of the crime.

Chicago, Ill., July 9.—Wilbur Glenn Voliva, overseer of Zion City, speaking at Central Zion Tabernacle here, predicted the destruction of Chicago, New York and other large cities, and called on his followers to hurry to Zion City, which, he said, would be the only place spared when the devastation comes.

"God's judgment is going to fall on the cities of the nations," he said. "You must come out of Babylon. There is no choice in the matter. I command you to come to Zion. Chicago will answer for rejecting Dr. Alexander Dowse, and you must be in Zion City to escape."

SEIZED WITH CRAMPS, DROWNS

A. S. Cox, of Elizabeth City, in Swimming at Nag's Head, N. C. Loses His Life—Expert Swimmer.

Elizabeth City, July 9.—Seized by a severe attack of cramps while in water not up to his neck A. S. Cox of Elizabeth City, N. C., was drowned at Nag's Head, N. C., Monday afternoon, according to information received by the United States Weather Bureau at Cape Hatteras last night. Cox was known to be a good swimmer. At the time of drowning he was in about five feet of water.

J. W. Danson and Mance Ramsey were in bathing less than 20 feet from shore when Cox went out of sight. They did not hear him make an outcry or try to save himself. When they did not see his head reappear they at once swam to it to where he sank, but the strong tide had swept his body farther out.

Danson and Ramsey rived and swam around for a half an hour, but could not locate the body which had not been recovered at nightfall. Cox was a traveling salesman for A. F. Gosney & Co., of Elizabeth City, and was spending the week end at the resort.

SITUATION IS SOME BETTER

Rebel Capital Full of Troops—Awaiting Orders to Leave.

Juarez, Mexico, July 9.—Though the new rebel capital here is full of insurrecto troops on the retreat from Bachimba, Pascual Orozco, Sr., is confident that they will keep intact for the invasion of Sonora, which is soon to be made.

Pascual Orozco, Jr., the rebel chief, was still at Saus, 190 miles south of here, early today, giving final directions to the column encamped there, which will be sent across the plains toward Casas Grandes.

The rebel commander was in frequent telegraphic communication with his father, Colonel Orozco, who is in charge of the Sonora garrison.

General O'Connell is said to desire the speedy transfer of the troops from here in the Casas Grandes region and trains were prepared early today for a movement of troops.

The mutinous spirit of the troops, which gave vent last night in several street quarrels had disappeared early today. All saloons and gambling houses being closed until the troops depart. Rebel officers say the discipline last night was used on the soldiers of retreat into a city. They look for no progress.
