SALVATION ARMY DOES GOOD WORK

Relieving Many Who Are in Distress, Assistance of Public Solicited.

But few people who do not receive aid from the local branch of the Salvation Army really know just how much good this organization is doing, or how much suffering they relieve. But regardless of this there is never a week that a number of needy persons do not solicit their assistance in some way and they are never refused if their case is worthy.

In the majority of the cases which come to the Army captain, the requests are for food and clothing, which is a very ask for money to be used in purchasing some needed article. An investigation is made at once and if the request is found to be based upon facts they are given aid.

To do this takes money, clothing and food. Collections are taken up at the outdoor meetings held each evening by the Army corps but these prove insufficient to supply the demands. Therefore the Army solicits the aid of the people of New Bern. If you cannot give money, a contribution of food or clothing no matter how small, will be greatly appreciated. If you cannot send your contribution to the Army headquarters on Broad street a telephone call will bring someone to your door to receive it.

J. T. King Promoted.

Mr. J. T. King of Wilmington has been appointed assistant general superintendent of transportation of the Atlantic Coast Line, with headquarters in Wilmington. For many years Mr. King has been an accountant of the Coast Line, with headquarters in Wilmington. Mr. S. A. Stockard, who has been his chief clerk, succeeds him in that position.

Ernal to Have Better School.

At an election held at Ernal last Saturday the citizens of that section voted a special school tax of 20 cents. The building will be enlarged, another teacher added to the staff of instructors, making two teachers instead of one, and it is hoped that the term may be increased from four to six months. The election was carried by a large majority.

CHARGED WITH ROBBERY STORE

Ten Dollars Purloined From the Till at N. Bashara's Store Sunday Morning.

Two hours of the Mayor's time was taken up in the municipal court yesterday afternoon in the disposal of the case of the State vs. John Whitfield, colored, in which the defendant was charged with entering the store of N. Bashara on Queen street Sunday morning and stealing \$10 from the cash drawer.

The case was rather complicated in many ways, chief of which was the fact that the prosecuting witnesses' knowledge of the English language was very limited and the services of an interpreter were required. From the evidence given in the case it seems that Whitfield in some way knew that the owner of the store and his family were engaged in preparing the noon meal and took advantage of this to enter the store and abstract the contents of the money drawer. But his calculations were not properly made. Just as he was in the act of closing the drawer and leaving the building the owner's sister appeared on the scene and at once laid hold of the intruder. Bashara succeeded in tying Whitfield but several of the latter's friends entered the store and cut his bonds. Later he was placed under arrest by officer Lon Bryan.

Probable cause was found in the case and the defendant bound over to the next term of Craven county Superior Court under a bond of \$100.00 which he could not give and was committed to the county jail.

Enforcing Sanitary Ordinances.

Another group of property owners who had failed to comply with the Sanitary Officer's orders to clean their premises were before Mayor McCarthy yesterday afternoon and in each case where guilt was found the defendant was taxed with the costs of the case. The authorities are determined that the Sanitary Officer's orders shall be enforced if there is any possible way of doing so.

Moving His Grocery Store.

Mr. H. C. Armstrong, who conducts a grocery store on Middle street, is making preparations to move his stock into the Rountree building on Pollock street. He hopes to have his entire stock in place in the new store by the latter part of the week.

GIVES FORTUNE FOR EDUCATION

Universities of Virginia and North Carolina Residuary Legatees.

Richmond, July 15.—Fearing that relatives may attempt to contest his will on the ground of alleged insanity, and so defeat his liberal plans for aid to Southern Education, John Armstrong Chaloner has conveyed his property, amounting approximately to \$1,500,000, in trust to the Virginia Trust Company of Richmond, naming the University of Virginia and the University of North Carolina as residuary legatees. Specific bequests of \$10,000 each are made to nine other educational institutions. Mr. Chaloner reserves the control of the property during his life time, and the right to vote the stock, but agrees not to encumber any of the real estate or hypothecate any of the securities, except for the permanent improvement of the property, and then only with the consent of the two universities which will fall heir to the major portion of his estate. The indenture indicating the purpose of Mr. Chaloner, has been filed with the clerk of the Superior Court of the county of Halifax, North Carolina, and has been accepted by the corporate authorities of the University of Virginia and University of North Carolina, the residuary legatees. Each of these institutions will if the wishes of Mr. Chaloner bear the test of the legal battle believed to be inevitable, come into more than \$500,000 on his death.

DEEP WATERWAYS WILL BE URGED

Governors of Atlantic States Will Deliver Addresses At Convention.

Philadelphia, Pa., July 15.—Congressman J. Hampton Moore, President of the Atlantic Deeper Waterways Association, has issued the call for the Fifth Annual Convention of that body which will take place September 4th, 5th and 6th, at New London, Conn., and from the present indications it will far exceed any previous convention in point of attendance.

The New London arrangements are being worked out by a committee of prominent business men and city officials, of which Mayor Bryan F. Mahan is chairman, and it is said that the program of entertainment will equal, if not excel, the best that has been provided at any of the previous gatherings.

One of the features of the Convention will be an assemblage of the Governors of the Atlantic Seaboard States on the first day. Fraternal greetings between the North and South will be a feature of these proceedings. Governor Baldwin, of Connecticut will make the address of welcome on behalf of the "Nutmeg" State and Governor Mann, of Virginia, will respond for the South. It is expected that President Taft and Governor Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey, will also be present during the exercises.

The Atlantic Deeper Waterways Association was formed in Philadelphia, in 1907, for the purpose of agitating an inland waterway from Mississippi to Florida. The agitation resulted in the adoption of a definite project, the largest section of which has been surveyed by Government Engineers and favorably recommended to Congress. This action extends from Boston across Cape Cod by canal to Buzzards Bay; to Long Island Sound; to Raritan Bay; across New Jersey by the New Jersey Sea-Level Canal to the Delaware River; to Delaware Bay; to the Delaware & Chesapeake Canal; to Chesapeake Bay, thence from Norfolk, Va., to Beaufort, N. C., over the Virginia-Carolina Waterway.

MAD DOG AMUCK PEOPLE EXCITED

Animal Was Causing Consternation In Northern Part of the City.

The residents of a section of West street were thrown into a state of consternation yesterday morning when it became known that a rabid dog was loose in that locality and had bitten several animals and had attacked several children. A hurry call was sent in for the police to come and kill the animal and Special Officer Brinson was soon on the scene. He located the dog and succeeded in striking him with one bullet from his revolver. This, however, proved insufficient to end its life and a shot gun was secured. By this time at least fifty people had joined in the chase. The officer finally succeeded in placing an entire load of shot in the dog's body. So far as is known no person was bitten but it is thought that several dogs were bitten and these will be watched to see if they exhibit any symptoms of hydrophobia.

CONFISCATE TWO BARRELS OF BEER

Two barrels of the beer that made Milwaukee famous was the toll of a raid made on the home of Gus Rountree, colored, on Bush street last Saturday night by Policeman Lon Bryan. The confiscated beer was placed on a wagon and carried to the city hall, where it is being held pending the outcome of a preliminary hearing before Magistrate W. K. Baxter this afternoon. Rountree claims the beer, but says he has not sold any and that he will have his property returned to him as soon as the trial is over.
