THE ESCHERICK ARRIVES, LEAVES

Brings Two Barges, Left one in Glubfoot Creek—Clears For Washington

MOTT SENSIBLE TYPE

Gasoline Freighter Carries Big Deck Load and Also Makes Good Speed.

The steam tug Frank K. Escherick, belonging to F. M. Munn Co., of Philadelphia, arrived yesterday, towing barges Uranus and Atlas. The Uranus is unloading salt and fertilizer at the Meadows warehouse.

The Escherick brought a third barge, the Squid, from Norfolk, and left her at the mouth of Clubfoot creek, to load lumber at the mill at Bachelor. The tug departed last evening for Washington, N. C.

A very sensible type of the modern gasoline freighter is the Mott, of Vanceboro, which left the Old Dominion dock last night for her home port, in charge of Capt. Claud Edwards. She carries a big deck load and with it makes nine miles an hour. The Mott runs on a regular schedule up Swift creek, between here and Vanceboro, making two or three trips a week.

The gasoline freighter Bernice Cree is at Blades' dock from Bogue sound with watermelons. The melons brought nine cents apiece for the primes, while the smaller ones, or "culls," brought five cents.

Power freighter M. Nelson, of Elizabeth City, lies at Blades' dock. The power boat Aradia came in yesterday from Baird's creek with produce and some peaches.

The power boat Bessie May arrived at noon yesterday from Clubfoot creek with a general cargo.

Sharpie schooner Bertie is on the ways at Meadows' marine railway for painting and general repairs.

Painters are at work on the anchors, dredge dippers and other iron work in the government yard at Union Point. Otherwise there is very little doing. The engineer's boat Sunshine, quarter boat Beaufort, snag boat and scow in its basin, indicating that there is no great activity just now in the government engineering department in these waters.

Brings Home Some Fine Corn.

Postmaster J. S. Basnight paid a visit to Mr. John Fields, at Fields' Station yesterday. He returned with a stalk of corn with four fully developed ears thereon. Mr. Basnight said that Mr. Fields took him through a field containing fifty acres of the finest corn he ever saw. No stalk had less than three ears, while some had as many as six.

WANTS FIGURES WITHOUT DELAY

An effort is being made to get the Atlantic Coast Line to give New Bern a northern connection for its freight and passenger traffic. A committee from the Chamber of Commerce will go before the officials of the Atlantic Coast Line just as soon as this committee can ascertain the amount of freight that is being handled yearly to and from New Bern.

A letter has been addressed to every merchant and industry in New Bern asking them to let the Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce know at once the amount of freight that they have handled in the last twelve months in dollars and cents.

The only ones who have complied with this request are the Armstrong Grocery Company, C. S. Hollister Co., the Basnight Hardware Co., and the New Bern Cotton Oil and Fertilizer Mills. Thus it can be readily seen that the merchants at large have not taken this proposition seriously or have overlooked the matter.

Again, I want to ask every merchant to please get up this information. AT ONCE for this is a matter of vital importance to be delayed any longer. As soon as each merchant has this information available they are requested to call the Chamber of Commerce room at once.

Good Start on Building.

A good start has been made on the foundation for the two-story brick building to be erected by Mr. W. A. McIntosh, on the northeast corner of Craven and South Front streets. The building will be large enough for two fine stores, one of which will be used as a warehouse for the New Bern Iron Works, of which Mr. McIntosh is treasurer, and the other will be a general store.

NORFOLK MAY BE LARGE NUMBER OF MOTOR CARS HERE

Railroads Expected to Meet Over a Hundred Sold in Comparative Short Time Sales Increase.

ONCE LARGE EXPORTER FIRMS WHICH SELL THEM

Interest in Automobiling Stimulus to Movement for Better Roads.

It is conservatively estimated that there are over one hundred motor cars in New Bern—that is, that have been sold here within a comparatively short time. The sales are rapidly increasing. In fact, the dealers are unable to supply the demand. Prompt deliveries are out of the question for the 1912 output of the factories is entirely exhausted. Many New Bern people who delayed ordering early in the spring are now anxiously waiting for their 1913 models.

The firms here handling the cars are: Hyman Supply Co., who have the Cadillac, E. M. F., Overland and Planders; The New Bern Motor Car Co., who sell the Ford, and the New Bern Garage Co., selling the Buick in all the different models.

This interest in automobiling is a great stimulus to the road movement. It does more to bring about improvement in the highways than anything else. The gasoline car will greatly help the county fair, as a number of motor vehicles are expected to be provided to carry visitors out to the grounds.

The C. S. Hollister company, wholesale grocers, have just purchased a new "Flanders 20" touring car from the Hyman Supply company for use of their salesman who make runs to nearby towns. Yesterday at noon their new chauffeur—to whom the machine seemed to be new in a double sense—was trying to get the power plant into action successfully for the first time. He would cheerfully crank the engine, attempt to start the car, place his foot upon the accelerator pedal, and just as soon as the engine began to wake up the would-be driver would get so excited that he unconsciously removed his foot from the accelerator, when the engine would promptly choke and go out of commission with a wheezy sigh. A more experienced "Chiffonier" arrived upon the scene, loaded the machine with passengers, including the amateur chauffeur, and proceeded upon the way rejoicing, without further trouble.

Other wholesale houses have also purchased machines for their salesmen. It enables them to make quicker and more enjoyable trips, and then there is some "collage" to a nice auto.

Rest Rooms Well Patronized.

The rest rooms over the Circulating Library are growing more popular with the ladies from the country and neighboring towns, judging from the increasingly large number who are making use of them. Several of those who have made use of the rooms have been heard to say that they have long wanted such a convenience. The Women's Club, under whose auspices the rest rooms are conducted, desire the visiting shoppers to make free use of the rooms and they also request the co-operation of the New Bern public in directing to the rest rooms shoppers in need of such a convenience.

MOTHER SEES SON LOSE HIS LIFE

Wilmington, Aug. 2.—Charles Benjamin Almond, Jr., son of Dr. and Mrs. C. B. Almond, of Winder, Ga., lost his life while in surf bathing near Seaside Inn, at Wrightsville Beach yesterday morning about 7 A. M.

There appeared to be a spark of life when the young man was brought from the water, but despite the work of two physicians for nearly two hours, he could not be resuscitated. Geo. S. Boylan went to the young man's assistance in the surf and held him up until a canoe manned by Fred W. Dick and Chas. S. Grainger arrived and brought them ashore.

The young man had his mother had spent two months at the seashore and had planned to return home this afternoon. The trip of the mother was changed in a moment from a joyous home-going to a mournful journey. The body will be taken to Winder tomorrow afternoon.
