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BOOSTERS TO BE HERE TOMORROW

Train Arrives at 1:20 p. m. Stops For Only Fifty Minutes.

TO PARADE STREETS

Accompanied by a Brass Band and Headed by Platoon of Police.

The Richmond Boosters' train will arrive tomorrow at 1:20 p. m. and leave for Kinston fifty minutes later. It will be met at the depot by a committee from the Chamber of Commerce and will parade, accompanied by a brass band, over the principal streets of the city.

At the head of the procession will be Chief of Police Lupton, mounted. By request of the boosters all the rest of the paraders will be on foot. Following the chief will be a platoon of four policemen. After them will come Mayor George Ainslee of Richmond and Mayor C. J. McCarthy of New Bern, who will be followed by President T. M. Carrington of the Richmond Chamber of Commerce and President L. H. Cutler, Jr., of the New Bern Chamber of Commerce.

The route of the parade will be up Middle to Broad, Broad to Craven, Craven to South Front, South Front to Middle, Middle to Elks' temple. At the latter place there will be a few brief speeches after which the Richmonders will hasten to the station to take their train for the remainder of the trip which will extend over four days and into all parts of North and South Carolina.

Postmaster J. S. Basnight has received the following letter from the manager of the Richmond branch of the Underwood Typewriter Company:

"Our Richmond Booster train, consisting of 125 Richmond jobbers, manufacturers, bankers and business men, arrives in your city at 1:30 p. m., Monday, 6th. We only have about fifty minutes to spend with you, and will be glad to have you and your friends meet our association at the depot and shake hands with our leading representative business men.

"This trip is purely a social event, and we are anxious all to meet you and know you and your citizens.

"We are looking forward to our trip to your city with much pleasure."

Similar letters have been received by business men generally, as the Boosters were careful to see that their coming was well advertised.

Daniels of Bayboro likewise made an address in which he vigorously urged the Democrats of Vanceboro and vicinity to stand by their fellow county man.

NEXT FRIDAY IS GOOD ROADS DAY

Public Meeting Will Be Held In Behalf of Highway.

TOUR STARTS MONDAY

Inspection Party Will Begin Long Journey at Tennessee Line.

On Friday next Mr. H. B. Varner and his party will inspect the Central Highway as due to arrive in New Bern. They will be entertained by the Chamber of Commerce and afterwards a public meeting is to be held in the court house. A body of representative men will accompany Mr. Varner on this trip. There will be members of the board of trustees of the Central Highway, Dr. Joseph Hyde Pratt, State geologist, members of newspaper men and representatives of various commercial bodies, automobile clubs and civic associations. Asheville, Salisbury and Raleigh will be among the cities represented by cars. A forty-horsepower Case car will carry Chairman Varner and Dr. Pratt. The cars were shipped to Waynesville and thence to the Tennessee line in Haywood county, where the tour will start Monday morning. The party expect to reach New Bern Friday afternoon, and the celebration will begin at once upon their arrival. All good roads enthusiasts hope that enough interest will be aroused to prove to the Highway promoters that New Bern is in line with the other cities of the State in their approval of the Highway movement.

The automobile party, augmented by the addition of a number of New Bern cars, will leave early Saturday forenoon for Morehead City, the terminus of the Highway.

Work began on the Central Highway in Craven county at the Lenoir county line, on the old New Bern-Kinston road, coming down through the Fort Barnwell section, last year, and has been prosecuted quite steadily ever since. At the present time the convict camp, with its merry band of road-makers is being moved from the upper end of the county to Thurman, in No. 7 Township. In this township road building will begin at the foot of the Trent river bridge from New Bern. The road through James City will be straightened, houses being moved to make this possible. A continuous stretch of improved highway, thirty feet wide, will be constructed from James City to the Craven county line at Havelock. The inspection party should not be discouraged because this stretch has not been completed. The work has been pushed just about as fast as it could be, under the circumstances.

From the Craven county line to the terminus at Morehead City the automobilists should not find very hard going. All of the road in Carteret county has been worked on and greatly improved. There has been an extra force of men ditching and raising the road through what is known as the Newport pocosin, for some weeks past. When the cars reach Mansfield, the drivers will find the road has had the finishing touches put on it clear to Morehead City. The section between Camp Glenn and the end of the line has been in fine shape for a long time.

At Newport the party will stop to form the nucleus of the good roads meeting that has been advertised for Saturday forenoon. Speeches will be made by Mr. Varner, Dr. Joseph Hyde Pratt and others. Continuing on to Morehead City, which it is the intention to reach early in the afternoon, the birthday of John McAdam, who built the first macadamized road, will be celebrated. This will be the 156th anniversary of his birth.

FOLEY VISITS MEAT AND FISH MARKETS

Dr. J. F. Foley, the new meat and milk inspector, made a round of the meat markets yesterday and gave the market and some advice as to the cleaning of meats and other details which have a bearing on the matter of compliance with the city ordinance. He also visited the fish markets and advised the fish dealers against the practice of hauling their wares around in the sun, which he says is liable to render the fish unfit for use.

FIRST OF ALLENS TO BE ACQUITTED

Wytheville, Va., Sept. 14.—"Not guilty" was the verdict rendered by the jury in the case against young Victor Allen, charged with participation in the Hillsville courthouse murders on the 14th of last March. The announcement brought quite a demonstration from the spectators, a large portion of whom were women.

The argument in the case was completed this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock and given at once to the jury, who were out thirty minutes considering their verdict. When it was announced Mr. Pogue, of counsel for the commonwealth, addressed the court, stating that he and his associates had no desire to do more than their duty and that, with permission of the court, the other indictments against the defendant would be dismissed, which was done.

The prisoner, surrounded by his four small children, received the congratulations of many in the courtroom and as he shook hands with the jury tears coursed down his cheeks.

This is the last of the trials growing out of the shooting up of Carroll county court last March, when the presiding judge, the sheriff, the commonwealth's attorney, a juror and a witness met death at the hands of the Allen clan.

For the murders, two men have been sentenced to the electric chair, Floyd Allen and Claude Allen, father and brother of the man who was acquitted today. Two other members of the clan, Fiel Allen and Sidas Edwards, were given long terms in the penitentiary. Sidas Allen and Wesley Edwards, who escaped, are still at large with apparently little hope of their capture.

WILSON SURE TO CARRY MARYLAND

Republicans Concede That Jersey Man Will Sweep The State.

PARTY CONTROL, STAKE

To Get It Taft and Roosevelt Men Play For Negro Vote.

Baltimore, Sept. 14.—While planning to make vigorous campaigns in Maryland, neither the Taft nor Roosevelt leaders have the slightest hopes of carrying this State for their favorite.

Although they will not state this publicly, many of them privately admit that Wilson's plurality will be unprecedented and he will get Maryland's eight electoral votes hands down.

The fight has resolved itself into one as to which faction of the Republican party can poll the most votes. With this result it is asserted goes control of the State organization. It is now in the hands of the Taft forces, and if they come out second they expect to keep on top, while if Roosevelt beats Taft in Maryland the supporters of the Bull Moose believe that it will put them in a position to get control of the organization.

There is really more hostility between the Taft and Roosevelt forces than there is between either faction and the Democrats. They are gunning for each other and not for Democrats.

Because of this condition the fight is developing into one for negro votes. In Maryland there are close to 50,000 registered negro voters, and with a few exceptions this has in the past been cast solidly for Republican candidates. It is to have much effect on the Taft and Roosevelt results this fall.

WRITES HER FATHER THAT SHE'S MARRIED.

Mr. F. Castet received a letter last night from his daughter, who left home several nights ago. She wrote that she and Mr. Mason were married in South Carolina and at the time the letter was written, were in Raleigh on their way to Virginia. Miss Castet and George N. Mason disappeared from here the same night and it was assumed that they had run away to get married. It was at first supposed that they were married in Goldsboro, but this turns out to have been a mistake.
