FACTS AND FIGURES.

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the New Bern Graded Schools held April 14 the President and the Secretary and Treasurer of the Board were instructed to prepare and publish a statement in the New Bern papers, setting forth the needs of more school facilities for the City Schools of New Bern.

Enrollment By Rooms and Grades.

Only 20 rooms, 10A and 10B and 8B have one-half room each.

Summary—Grades 1B and 1C have no rooms and are held from 1 to 3:45 p. m., in rooms just vacated by grades 2A and 2C.

One teacher in the High School has no room and is compelled to teach in the hall, basement or any place not already occupied.

The above makes 5 rooms needed just at this time—and would not provide for any growth in the attendance at school whatsoever.

Grades 1A, 3B, and 5B are also very large, but at present can be managed with poor results to the pupils.

FIGURES ON THE GROWTH OF THE POPULATION—showing that rooms should be provided now to take care of the growth for the next two years or more.

Average Daily Attendance.

Increase 1913 over 1908-09 is 166 per day.

Average increase past 4 years has been 46 per day.

Taking this average as a basis, we should have about 100 more pupils in the next 2 years, and we should provide for this increase now.

Facts and Figures Showing The Need of More School Buildings For The City of New Bern.

No additional rooms have been built since the summer of 1909 when addition was made to Griffin Building, although the average school attendance has increased 186 per day.

LOCATION OF SCHOOL ENROLLMENT AND CENTRAL LOCATION OF SCHOOL PLANT TO PRESENT POPULATION.

The present school enrollment is 923.

Of this number 133 reside north of Queen street, and 137 reside west of George street—or 267 outside of the section of the city bounded on the North by Queen street and West by George street—while 70 per cent live in this section.

The school Buildings as now located are within 200 ft. of the centre of a line running from Avenue A to the corner of East and South Front streets, and the distance to McCarthy's store from the School Green is only about 1 block farther than the corner of East Front and South Front Streets.

A circle drawn with the centre at the middle point of the Academy Green and with a radius equal to the distance to corner of South Front and East Front streets, would leave not over 50 pupils on the outside of the circle.

The Graded School Board has nothing whatever to do with pupils living outside the city limits. This is a matter for the County Board which this year pays tuition for such pupils, the number being 21 and the amount for such pupils living North and West of the city limits is about \$100.00 for the 4 months.

Seven of the 21 pupils mentioned above live West and 14 live North of the city limits.

MEETING OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES APRIL 14, 1913.

R. A. Nurn moved the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. That the Board of Trustees appoint a committee to prepare and to publish a statement of the needs of the Graded Schools of the city.

2. That the Board of Trustees now record its intention to request the Board of Aldermen of the city to issue bonds of the city, in the event the voters of the city in this next election authorize the issuance of any, in an amount not exceeding the sum of \$40,000, and to levy an additional special tax in an amount not exceeding 5c. on \$100 valuation of property and 15c. on the poll.
