PLANTING SPONGES.

Methods of Making Them Grow In Use on the Florida Coast.

Biscayne bay, Sugar Loaf key, Anclote keys and Key West, on the Flor-Ida coast, are the principal places in this country where experiments in sponge culture have been made. The various methods are as follows:

"Seed" sponges are cut into small pieces and, after having been attached by wiring or spindle to circular or triangular cement blocks, are dropped or lowered (depending upon the depth) to rest on the ocean bottom, where they remain for a year or two until they reach a size proper for commercial purposes. They are then taken by the hook, when new cuttings are attached and the cement blocks let down again. Another method was to string them on a wice held horizontal by stakes driven in the bottom. In doing this, however, various difficulties arose. The sponges became loose and rotated on the wire, enlarging the hole made through them, and the action of the your agent or communicate with. salt water corroded and destroyed the wires until, after many trials and experiments, a lead wire with a copper core was successfully used .- St. Nich-
