**High Prices of Grain.**

The short crop of 1881 has given the cereals and Indian corn a very decided boom. We suppose corn is selling higher in New Berne at this time than it has for a number of years at this season. Whether this is due to short crop or to speculation is a mooted question with some.

The Chicago Tribune points out that at no time since the establishment of railroad transportation between Chicago and the seaboard, or steam navigation between the Atlantic ports and Liverpool, has there been such a complete wreck and demoralization in rates of transportation and prices of grain as at the present date. Charters for wheat and corn by rail to New York and steamer to Liverpool can be had at 20 cents per 100 pounds. The official rate by rail to New York alone is 25 cents per 100 pounds. Steamers are taking wheat and corn from New York to Liverpool at one and two cents a bushel, and even at nothing, for ballast. The Tribune has this to say of the way prices are affected:

The once inexorable rule that the price at the place of destination fixes the price at the point of shipment; the cost of transportation being the difference, falls under the extraordinary condition of there being no definite charge for transportation. The prices here being greater than foreign purchasers are willing to pay no shipments are made, and there is no demand for transportation. The holders of grain on this side are confident of ultimately obtaining all that they demand, and are indifferent whether the stuff goes forward or not. The result, however, is most extraordinary. The markets at Liverpool and Chicago are wholly independent of one another, with that at Liverpool the lower. There being no exports or shipments, no transportation by rail or water on land or ocean is needed, so the fact is, wonderful as it may be, that there is no market price for grain and no market price for transportation by rail or by ocean steamer. Everything is wrecked, demoralized, and for the time destroyed.

The long and short of it is that speculators have run the prices of grain higher at Chicago than they are at Liverpool. When the break comes these speculators will probably be swept away. The present price of wheat in Chicago for April and May delivered is about 33.1-3 per cent higher than the average price for twenty-seven years. In corn it is even worse, and is over 70 per cent higher than for twenty-two years past.

The bad condition of the country roads in the West keeping back the supply, with the short crops of last year, are assigned as the legitimate cause of the peculiar conditions of the market.

As a National party the Republicans are approaching their end. The Republicans of North Carolina have nothing to cheer them. They are not at unity among themselves, but they did live in the belief of the solid unity of the party as a national one. That hope is now gone. And if they had any hope in the State, if they hoped to get into power here, it was through the solidity of the negro vote, and by the asserted stronger claims of that race to consideration. The Goldsboro Convention has made that impossible; for how can the negro ask to be put higher than he is when he shows himself unfit and incapable to stand where he is? John Williamson, a negro editor, member of the Legislature, a good talker, sharp and shrewd, says the exhibit of negro incapacity and turbulence at that convention is worth ten thousand votes to the Democratic party.—*Ashville Citizen.*
