Democratic Organization.

The News and Observer of May 7th calls attention to the change of plan of organization adopted by the Democratic party two years ago, and as this new plan has never come into general use we direct attention to some of its features as a matter of news to the readers of the JOURNAL.

Following the policy of the Republican party the Democratic Conventions in the future are to be assemblies of delegates and not mass meetings. The township meetings are the mass meetings and there delegates are selected to represent the township in the county convention.

In the county conventions each township may cast one vote for every one hundred Democratic votes, and one vote for fractions over fifty Democratic votes cast by that township for Governor at the last preceding election. Provided that in cases where the township is divided into Wards or precincts, each of said Wards or precincts shall be entitled to send delegates to the County Convention, and shall cast its proportionate part of its township's vote.

The County Conventions shall be entitled to elect to their respective Judicial, Senatorial and Congressional Conventions, one delegate for every one hundred Democratic votes, and one for fractions over fifty Democratic votes cast at the last preceding gubernatorial election in their respective counties. And if any such delegate shall be unable to attend such conventions, he shall be authorized to appoint his own alternate.

In the State Conventions the counties shall be represented by delegates, or alternates designated by the delegates appointed at the County Convention. Each county shall be entitled to elect one delegate for every three hundred Democratic votes, and one delegate for fractions over one hundred and fifty Democratic votes cast therein at the last preceding gubernatorial election.

Under this apportionment the following will be the number of delegates to be sent to the State Convention from the counties named:

Beaufort, 6; Carteret, 3; Craven, 4; Duplin, 7; Greene, 3; Jones, 2; Lenoir, 4; Onslow, 3; Pamlico, 2; Pitt, 7; Wayne, 8; and Hyde 3.

Stored Power.

The electricity question will always be an interesting one until it is definitely settled just what it will and what it will not do. And just now no one will dare to say that anything is impossible in the future of this subtle force of nature.

At the Electrical Exhibition now going on at the Crystal Palace, London, the question of storage of power by electrical means seems to have been practically solved and we may expect to soon have the benefits of it in this country. The world is rapidly exhausting its supply of motive power and by this process we can make available the unlimited power given out by wind and tide and running water, the solution of the power of the future is unquestionably made.

From the Scientific American we quote on this subject:

For example, anybody who chooses to put a windmill upon his house or barn will be able, by means of the electric battery, to light his dwelling, to supply it with heat and hot water for washing and cooking,

drive sewing machines, churns, wash-tubs, pumps, keep electrical carriages that will run anywhere about town without horses, do his plowing, draw mowers, reapers, seeders, propel boats, and perform almost any sort of work that may be required. The rotation of the windmill, running day or night steadily or intermittently, costing nothing except repairs, will have its power stored up and held in the secondary battery, and by the touch of a button to be instantly delivered and put to use when wanted in the form of light, heat, or power. The battery forms in effect a reservoir of force, which when connected with an electrical lamp yields light, or with an electric machine yields heat or motive power. Furthermore, the battery is quite portable, and may be placed in an ordinary carriage, giving motion thereto, like a locomotive. But there is no boiler to explode, and no fuel or water to be supplied. Women and children may safely use it. Every class of society, from highest to lowest, every art and industry in the civilized world, will benefit by its adoption. These, we say, are only some of the indicated uses and advantages of the new invention, if all that is claimed for it be true.
