

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—Mr. Blair's resolution calling for information as to the quantity of lands embraced in the land grants to certain owners, with the quantity patented and the amount accruing for roads constructed, etc., was adopted. The list of roads mentioned as further enlarged upon the suggestion of Mr. Blair is as follows: Sioux City & St. Paul & Pacific; First division Winona & St. Peter; Cedar Rapids & Missouri River; Mobile & Girard; Pensacola & Georgia; Iowa Falls & Sioux City; North Louisiana & Texas; West Wisconsin, Lake Superior & Mississippi; Alabama and Chattanooga.

The Senate soon after 10 o'clock, dispensed with calendar and resumed the consideration of the District Appropriation bill.

A number of committee amendments were ruled out on points of order and the bill was finally reported from the Committee.

Notes were taken upon several amendments and the committee was sustained in each instance and no further change made and the bill was passed.

Mr. Hawley reported from the Military Committee a joint resolution appropriating \$10,000, or so much thereof as may be needed to furnish food to the people made destitute by floods in the State of Mississippi. He said the planter there had for a long time been paying field hands in the expectation of being remunerated by the coming crop, but that the late flood had disappointed these expectations and necessitated this additional provision. The joint resolution was passed and the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—On motion of Mr. Curtin, Pa., the bill was passed increasing to \$40 per month the pension of any person who in the late war lost an arm, hand or foot, or received disabilities therefrom.

The House then, at 11:15, went into committee of the whole, Mr. Updegraff in the chair, and resumed the consideration of the General Deficiency Appropriation bill.

At 3:10 the consideration of the bill was completed, and the committee rose and reported it back to the House.

Motion to strike out the appropriations for the payment of the amounts due land grant railroads for army transportation, and for bureaus in the navy department, were lost.

Motion to strike out the clause appropriating \$112,000 for the payment of special deputy marshals at the Congressional elections in 1881 and prior years was lost.

In speaking of this proposition Mr. Cox of New York said: Inasmuch as the men selected for these positions at our elections performed their work, and are not in any sense responsible for the law under which they acted, and as the money is their due, we desire to say that in voting for this proposition we do not include our well considered judgment as to the invalidity of the Federal law.

The bill then passed; yeas 116, nays 57.

The House immediately thereafter went into committee of the whole on the Legislative, Executive and Judicial Appropriation bill. In explaining the bill Mr. Cannon, of Illinois, said the bill provided for an increase of employees in the Pension Office at an expense of \$1,742,000, but outside of that item it appropriated only \$220,000 more than the bill for the current year. If this increase of force in the Pension Office were agreed to during the next four years there would be required \$425,000 to pay pensions, but it was better to expend the surplus revenue in that manner than to have it remain in the Treasury a standing temptation to those who desired to promote schemes at the cost of the government. The committee then rose. Adjourned.

NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, June 8.—The Post's cotton report says future deliveries after having advanced 5 points, fell as much before the third call.

Five children, three girls and two boys, sons and daughters of John Lockwood, of —, are reported to have been killed last evening while walking on the track of the New York & New Haven Railway near that village. They heard the train approaching and crossed over to the adjoining track, when they were run over and crushed to death by a train which came upon them from the opposite direction.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, June 7.—Mr. Keene's Foxhall has won the race for the Gold Cup, valued at 1,000 sovereigns.

PANAMA, May 29.—Intelligence from the Coast is to the effect that Ecuador is in the throes of revolution, Peru in anarchy and disorder, Bolivia, at a safe distance from the coast, preserving a show of military force, and Chili smitten by epidemics in various parts and cursed by brigandage. Chilean papers fully corroborate the latter statement.

SETTINGE, June 8.—The following has been received from Slavonic sources: Austrian battalions were attacked on the 25th instant by 200 insurgents near Morinie, north of Mostar. The Austrians were surprised and compelled to retreat with the loss of 95 killed. The insurgents lost 26 killed and wounded. On the 3d instant the insurgents attacked and destroyed the Austrian barracks at Bischna, killing 25 of the troops. The rest fled.

CALIFORNIA.

KANSAS CITY, June 8.—The following are the particulars of a bank robbery at Brookfield, Mo., yesterday. Six armed men rode into the town of Brookfield just as the bank was closing for the day, dismounted, and covering the clerks, with their revolvers, robbed the safe of about \$5,000. They kept up a rapid fusillade with their fire arms as they rode through the place, over awing the townspeople. The men were all masked. The county Sheriff and the Marshal organized a posse as early as possible and started after the robbers. Dick Little, ex-Marshall Leggett and others in this city who are familiar with the James gang, think that Frank James was not connected with this affair, although they admit that the job was done in the James Boys' style. It is claimed that Frank is not in the neighborhood. There is plenty of tall timber around Brookfield, and it is not thought likely that the gang will be captured. A dispatch from St. Joseph says that a party of men have been stopping on the Harper farm, five miles Southeast of Kirksville, near Brookfield, for the past three weeks. They kept their revolvers on all the time, and nobody knew them. Several horses were stolen there on Saturday night.

WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—To-day the President nominated A. J. Crapsey, P. M., at Terrell, Texas.

The Senate Finance Committee had a special meeting to-day to consider the Tariff Commission nominations which were sent to the Senate and referred to this Committee.

In Executive session yesterday, after some discussion, it was decided to make a favorable report to the Senate. All the Republican members of the committee were present and voted aye, while Messrs. Bayard and Beck, the only Democratic members present, voted no.

TEXAS.

ST. LOUIS, June 8.—A dispatch from Dallas, Texas, says: A large company of well-to-do representative negroes from Mississippi passed through here last night en route to Chihuahua, Mexico. They will prospect in the mining and agricultural regions, and if the country suits and they can secure property cheap, and the Mexican Government is friendly towards them, they will settle there and be followed in the fall by two hundred of the best colored families in Mississippi. The plan is to establish a colony.

PROBABILITIES.

WASHINGTON, June 8.—For the Middle Atlantic States, partly cloudy weather with light local rains and stationary or a slight fall in temperature, southerly to westerly winds. For South Atlantic States, southerly to westerly winds and occasional rains, stationary or slowly falling barometer and nearly stationary temperature.

TENNESSEE.

NEW YORK, June 8.—A Chattanooga special to the Tribune says: D. B. Coffman, editor of the Rockwood Republican, was assaulted in Kingston yesterday by J. W. Hood. He was severely beaten over the head with a club. Both men were Republicans, and the difficulty originated over political differences.

NORTH CAROLINA.

RALEIGH, June 8.—The case in the U. S. Circuit Court against Cousins and others, Democratic county canvassers of Halifax county, for not counting the returns in the Congressional election of 1880, was called to-day before Judges Bond and Seymour. A jury has been empanelled and one witness examined.

KENTUCKY.

CINCINNATI, June 8.—The Commercial Louisville special says Senator Ben. Hill and family arrived late last night and go to Atlanta in the morning. The Senator's son says his father will be in the Senate before the close of the session.

ALABAMA.

MONTGOMERY, June 8.—The Democratic State Convention to-day nominated E. A. O'Neal for Governor by acclamation.

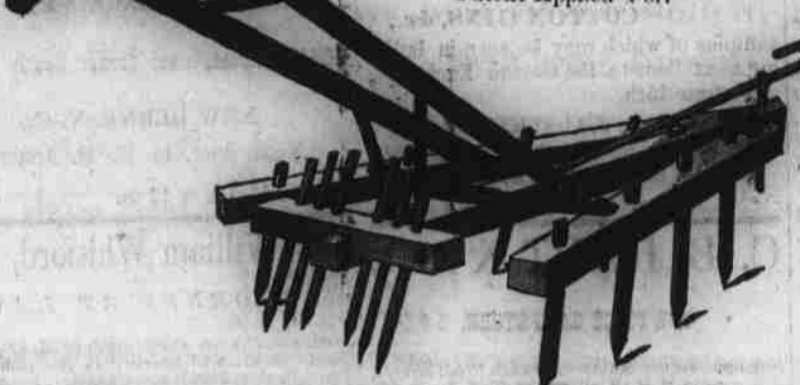
