"ALEX., July 26, 8.50 .A M.—At 9 o'clock last evening a decided attempt was made to surprise the British outposts. Under cover of the darkness a force of 600 men approach close to the British lines when the Thirty-eighth regiment opened fire. The enemy retreated precipitately. During the remainder of the night the Egyptians continued moving about just be-youd range. The attempt was preceded by reports that Arabi Pasha was attempting to treat for conditions for his surrrender and that a white flag was flying over his intrenchments. The reports were probably circulated to lull the vigilance of the British."

ALEXANDRIA, July 12.—As for the sailors, notwithstanding the warm nature of yesterday's fire and their fortunate escape from serious casualities, they are eager to be at work again, and are lenging for another bout before the soldiers ar-rive to take the work out of their hands. However, it is very for-tunate that all the conical shot missed the vessels yesterday, for had we been struck on the water line by them instead of by the many well-aimed round shot, the ship would certainly have been obliged to go out of action, and would not improbably have been sunk, for our armor would hardly resist ten-inch rifled shot.—London Daily News.
