Arabi Pasha Defeated.

ARABIA, Sept. 13.—The Khedive has received a telegram from Sultan Pasha saying the British attack on Tel-el-Kebir commented at 4:30 this morning.

LONDON, September 13.—The correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company at Alexandria announces that Tel-el-Kebir was carried this morning. Forty guns and a large number of prisoners were captured. The cavalry are in chase. Arabi's force appears to be broken up. A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from the front reports the demoralization of Arabi's army as complete. His infantry are flying towards the desert.

Iron Mills to Resume Work.

PITTSBURGH, Sept. 10.—The men are rapidly breaking away from the Amalgamated Association, and within the next forty-eight hours a number of mills will be in operation in this district with union men, who have signified a desire to return to work without signing the scale at last year's rates. Among the mills which will resume are those of Graff, Bennett & Co.; Everson, Macrum & Co.; Henry Lloyd & Son, and Brown & Co., Pittsburgh; Reis Brothers & Co., of Newcastle, Pa., and Brown, Bownell & Co., of Youngstown. Of these, Graff, Bennett & Co., and Reis Brothers & Co., will resume to-morrow, and the balance on Tuesday. Graff, Bennett & Co. will start their steel department, Everson, Macrum & Co., their sheet mill, Lloyd & Sons one bar mill, and Brown & Co. the train rolls. The other departments will resume as soon as possible.

Attempt to Burn the Sprague Property.

PROVIDENCE, Sept. 10.—Another attempt to burn the Sprague property at Cranston was made last night. The dwelling house is occupied by Dr. Lawton and his family. Mrs. Lawton was sitting up, being too nervous to sleep, and discovered two men and a flash of fire in some broken lattice work. She alarmed the watchman, close at hand who gave pursuit and fired at the retreating incendiaries, but without effect. The family had partially packed their goods to move, fearing incendiaries. This is the first attempt to burn the dwelling house on the Sprague estate, but four barns and two mills have been destroyed.

Bearing Fruit for a Century.

An apple tree that has borne fruit nearly a century stands on the farm of William L. Cornell, in Little Neck, and is said to be the largest tree of its kind on Long Island. It is fourteen feet four inches in circumference near the ground, and bears fruit of an excellent quality and flavor.

A Turtle Seven Feet Long.

A hawksbill turtle, weighing some 800 pounds, was captured by Ransford Poland of Ocean Beach, N. J., in his fish nets. He was seven feet in length and of a grayish white.
