### The Elm City has arrived.

The snow flakes were falling last night.

Five hundred bushels of rice sold yesterday. Price \$1.00 per bushel.

The schooner *Elizabeth* is at the Midland wharf with a cargo of salt.

The schooner *Anderson* is at the Midland wharf loading with lumber for New York.

The eastern mail and passenger train did not arrive from Goldsboro yesterday until about 5 o'clock, p. m. The delay was caused by running off the track while shifting at Goldsboro.

The accident on the Midland road yesterday has caused a postponement in the funeral of Mrs. Mary Meadows. The remains arrived in New Berne late in the evening and the burial services will take place from the Methodist church this morning at 11 o'clock.

### Mayor's Court.

### Found Dead.

On Tuesday the body of a colored man was found on the Bayboro road below here, near Mr. S. W. Latham's. Coroner Bates, upon receiving the information, summoned a jury of inquest and viewed the body on yesterday and returned the following verdict: "The deceased came to his death from exposure and exhaustion." His name was not known.

### Directors Meeting.

Messrs. John D. Whitford, C. C. Clark and F. C. Roberts went up to Goldsboro yesterday evening to attend a meeting of the A. & N. C. R. R. Directors this morning at 10 o'clock. The meeting is called, we learn, by telegraph, to take action on allowing the Midland to take down \$20,000 from the Bank, by delivering two new engines.

But the stockholders have said that the Lease is forfeited. Have the Directors any authority at all to treat with the Midland? We think not.

### Evangelical Alliance.

### Small Pox in Virginia.

LYNCHBURG, Jan. 8.—Small pox is raging at Lynchburg, Virginia; thirty cases having already been reported. The towns of Roanoke and Wytheville have quarantined against Salem, and other southern towns are considering doing likewise. Roanoke College has suspended and the students have gone home. The public schools have also closed and business is at a stand still.

## WAR REMINISCENCES.

### The Elm City Rifles.

Upon the organization of a new military company which is now being perfected in the city of New Berne, it would not be amiss to give a brief history of one of the old companies which is now considered as among the things of the past.

The military parade at the grand celebration in New Berne on the completion of the Atlantic and N. C. Railroad inspired the young men of the city with a military zeal that culminated in the organization of the

with the following officers: George C. Lewis, Captain; Wiley F. Higgins, 1st Lieutenant; Harvey Sawyer, 2nd Lieutenant; and Mason Chadwick, 3rd Lieutenant. About fifty names were enrolled, not one of whom was over twenty-one years old; their ages ranging from fourteen to twenty-one. Application was made to Governor Bragg for arms and equipments which were furnished, sending them the Harper's Ferry sword bayonet file.

When the news of John Brown's raid on Harper's Ferry was flashed over the wires to New Berne, Capt. Lewis promptly tendered the service of the Cadets to Governor Wise who declined with thanks as Virginia was prepared for the emergency.

In 1860 the company applied to the Legislature for a change in the name which was granted, and after that time was known as the

At the breaking out of the "War between the States," the services of the company were immediately tendered to Gov. Ellis; they were accepted and the company ordered to Fort Macon on the 16th day of April, 1861. Up to this time some changes had been made in the commissioned officers. Lieutenants Higgins, Sawyer and Chadwick having resigned, Alex. Miller was elected 1st Lieutenant; R. D. Hancock 2nd Lieutenant, and J. F. Helen, Jr. 3rd Lieutenant. Lieut. Higgins afterwards joined the company and was made commissary until promoted to a lieutenant in Whitford's regiment; Sawyer raised a company in Jones county which served in the regiment with the Elm City Rifles and did as hard service as any company in the war; Chadwick assisted in raising a company, of which he was 1st Lieut., in the neighborhood of Bachelor's creek.

Arriving at Fort Macon, Capt. Lewis, being the senior officer present, took command until the arrival of Col. O. C. Tew. After remaining here about one month the "Rifles" were ordered to return to New Berne and recruit their company to the maximum number required by law. Arriving at New Berne they went into camp in the Fair grounds but did not remain more than a week before they were ordered to Fort Lane below the city to assist in preparing for the defence of New Berne. In a short time they were again ordered back to the city and went into camp on the vacant lot on the corner of Middle and Johnson streets. On the 17th of June they were ordered to Garysburg and assigned to the 2d Regiment of State Troops which was organized with C. C. Tew as Col. Up to this time they had acquired a good knowledge of the company drill and were ready for lessons in the battalion drill which they received daily while at Garysburg as well as going through the regular course of camp measles and mumps. The regiment was ordered on the 13th of July to Virginia but owing to the detention of Col. Tew on the coast preparing for the defense of Beaufort harbor, New Berne and other points, it did not arrive in time to participate in the first battle of Manassas. From this time on the history of the Elm City Rifles is identical with that of the Army of Northern Virginia. With the exception of about two months spent around Goldsboro and Wilmington immediately after the fall of New Berne they remained in Virginia until the surrender at Appomattox. They were engaged in nearly every hard fought battle in Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania. Many of their bones now mingle with the clay of Malvern Hill, Mechanicsville, Cold Harbor, Chancellorsville, Sharpsburg, Gettysburg, Spotsylvania and other places. They served at different times under Gen. D. H. Hill and E. E. Rhodes as division commanders; Stonewall Jackson, Ewell, Early and Gordon as corps commanders. We give below a list of the original volunteers who left New Berne with the company in June 1861, giving date of enlistment, age, whether killed or died and in what battles wounded. In organizing the new company would it not be well to preserve the name of the old one with such an honorable record?
