All through, the interior of the country at almost every town and village, are to be found "runners," usually Indians, whose business it is to carry small packages upon their shoulders from place to place.

Knowing all the mountain paths Knowing all the mountain paths and short cuts and possessing a vast amount of strength and staying power, these "runners" make long journeys in a prodigiously illustrates both the custom of gift HENRY L. HALL. sending and the manner of sending gifts: One of my friends here in Monterey, being then on his way home from the City of Mexico, School Books, Blank Books, stopped for a night with his car-riage, horses and servants at a hospitable rancho, where he was admirably well entertained. the evening of the next day he-came to a town famous for its delicious fish, and as an acknowledgement of the hospitality tendered him he sent a "runner" with a basket of fish to his host of the night before. The distance, allowing for short-cuts, was forty miles across a mountainous country; yet the "runner" made it inside of ten hours—leaving at 7 o'clock at night, and arriving at the rancho (as my friend was subsequently informed) at 5 o'clock the next morning. They wear two garments, a short calico skirt and a very contracted

alligator teeth, carious bones, wild hogs' teeth, and cheap jewelry, which the brave purchases in the town before he begins drinking. Like all Indian women they do nearly all the drudgery, but the braves are generally kind to them. The children are delicate looking little things, but the pappoons are really beautiful babies. These Indians so from places in a course. dians go from places in a cypress-dug-ont, which is wider than the regular Indian cance, and which they usually row instead of pole, owing to the fact that the water in this country is deep. They are very expert in using the oar. They do not do away with the pole, how-ever. An Indian in the bow of the boatrows one oar, and another sits in the stern with a pole, with which he rows and steers. The sharply cut dug-out glides quietly through the water, the speed being quite wonderful. The boats go 300 miles into the Lake Okeechebee, and a Florida Indian is as happy in one as he is one share.
