alligator teeth, curious bones, wild hogs' teeth, and cheap jewelry, which the brave purchases in the town before he begins drinking. Like all Indian women they do nearly all the drudgery, but the braves are generally kind to them. The children are delicate-looking little things, but the papooses are really beautiful babies. These Indians go from places in a cypress dug-out, which is wider than the regular Indian canoe, and which they usually row instead of pole, owing to the fact that the water in this country is deep. They are very expert in using the oar. They do not do away with the pole, however. An Indian in the bow of the boat rows one oar, and another sits in the stern with a pole, with which he rows and steers. The sharply cut dug-out glides quietly through the water, the speed being quite wonderful. The boats go 300 miles into the Lake Okechee, and a Florida Indian is as happy in one as he is on shore.
