THE RESOURCES OF THE SOUTH IN THE SOUTHERN EXPOSITION.

We have received from the managers of the Southern Exposition, which will open at Louisville, August 1st, a printed slip which we copy, giving some idea of the extent of the preparation being made by the different States to secure space in the grounds in order to exhibit their resources.

The projectors of the Southern Exposition were impelled by the leading idea of bringing the attention of the world to the vast natural products of the South, and furnishing the Southern people a convenient opportunity for examining all the modern improvements in machinery that might help to enhance the value of the products which nature had so bountiful bestowed upon them.

The Northern and Eastern people of the United States, with characteristic energy and enterprise, lost no time in taking hold of the project, and even before the necessary arrangements were completed for receiving applications for space, began applying for the privilege of exhibition in such numbers that the success of the undertaking as an exhibition was immediately assured.

The earliest assurance was that Northern builders of machinery, and Southern buyers of machinery would certainly come together in the Southern Exposition, and make it a great and interesting exhibition. The further purpose is now being realized of the South making a grand display of her resources with a view to inviting new people to make their homes in that section.

Not only will this display attract the attention of foreign immigration, but the farmers and miners and woodmen of all the overtilled and overworked parts of the country will see in the Southern Exposition the evidences of the Southern land of promise that is just now presenting itself to the consideration of the world.

The great railway systems of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad and the Cincinnati Southern Railroad have entered the lists, each with a corps of agents in the field making careful and comprehensive collections of products illustrating the natural wealth of the vast territory penetrated by their respective lines of railway. The State of

Tennessee has already filed her formal application for three thousand feet of space in which her commissioners of agriculture may exhibit the varied resources of that inviting State. Commissioners appointed by the State Governors of other Southern States are actively engaged in arranging exhibits that will justify the pretensions of their respective States to be classed among the most inviting fields of America, and in due time will define the space they desire in the great exhibition.

The development of this spirit of emulation among the Southern people gives welcome assurance of the consummation of the entire project of the Southern Exposition. The North has already responded, and the only question in that connection affecting the managers of the exhibition is the already serious problem of finding room for all the valuable and interesting exhibits that are asking space in the machinery department. All anxiety that might have existed a few weeks ago, as to the ability of the South to fill out her part in this great array, has been relieved by the recent activity and earnestness of the Southern States.

The Southern Exposition will doubtless be, as its name implies a thorough and complete exhibit of all the agricultural and natural products of that favored territory known to the country as the South.

By telegrams from Charlotte we see that the Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Diocese of North Carolina at the session just closed, has passed a resolution, dividing the present, or rather creates a new Diocese out of the territory of the old one. The dividing line was changed from that of the one submitted to the Convention a year ago, and is established as follows: Commencing at the Virginia line, at the intersection of the Virginia line and the eastern line of Northampton county and following the eastern lines of Northampton, Halifax, Edgecombe, Wilson, Johnson, Hornett, Moore and Richmond; all the counties west of this to be the Diocese of North Carolina, and all east to be the new Diocese which has not yet been given a name.

By this division it will be seen that the new Diocese embraces thirty-two counties, all in the east and south-eastern section of the State; and the measure only awaits the consent of the General Convention which meets in October and the election of a Bishop to put it in full force and effect.

The Episcopal fund which amounts to \$35,000 and yields an income of \$2,500 is to be equally divided between the old and the new, which will entail the additional expense on each, of some eight or nine hundred dollars to support its Bishop and is not at all burdensome.

We think the members of the Church here should make a determined effort to secure the residence of his new Bishop in New Bern; it is centrally situated and as convenient to the extreme limits of his territory as any town, and the advantages of a cathedral or chapel of course would be an addition to the city, in many respects.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

WASHINGTON, May 25. Notwithstanding the fact that Washington has been deserted this week by the Administration, the ship of state sails smoothly on. Several of the Cabinet officers are seeking recreation, fishing, or attending to duties elsewhere, and others accompanied President Arthur to New York to attend the ceremonies of the opening of the East River Bridge.

The association of ladies who have for years been pursuing the patriotic undertaking of restoring and caring for the home of George Washington were on Wednesday conveyed from this city to Mount Vernon, where they held their annual council. Since 1873 the endowment fund of this enterprise has grown from \$1,000 to \$28,000, which is judiciously invested by the society's treasurer. Each State through representative ladies takes some one room of the venerable mansion under its patronage, so far as the number of rooms will allow and restores and furnishes it in style as nearly contemporaneous with Washington's time as possible and in many cases the original furniture has been secured and replaced.

The tedious Star Route Trial approaches its end. Colonel Ingersoll is making the closing argument for the defense, and the case is likely to be given to the jury the first week in June. The trial has been largely attended this week. Every morning before the opening hour the court room has been packed, ladies forming full half of the audience. The defendants do not attend often, but the "defense ladies," as they are called, the wives, sisters, aunts, and cousins of the accused come regularly to their reserved seats.

Monday afternoon the President appointed Walter Evans, of Louisville, Ky., Commissioner of Internal Revenue, vice General Baum. He is a lawyer, a Republican, and a favorite of Post Master General Gresham.

Mr. Lyman, the chief examiner of the civil service commission, has freely expressed himself as opposed to the employment of females in the Department. Many women who now hold Government positions, as well as those who wish to apply for places, stand somewhat in awe of him, and fear his influence may be exerted against them, and unfair discriminations made in examinations and reports of the commissioners.

Post Master General Gresham has signified his intention of making a number of changes in the clerical force of the Post Office Department before the end of the present fiscal year. He proposes to remove some of the older employees, and fill their places with younger and more vigorous men. In cases where the old clerks can perform light, easy work, they will probably be retained at reduced salaries.
