There were 183 deaths from cholera in Egypt last Sunday.

LONDON, Aug. 20.—Most Rev. Roger Bede Vaughan, Catholic Archbishop of Sydney, New South Wales, died suddenly at Liverpool Saturday.

A serious riot occurred in the town of Coolbridge, Lanark county, Scotland, last Saturday between parties of Orangemen and Catholics.

SOUL LAKE, Texas, Aug. 19.—Horatio Parsons was killed by lightning on Friday. His body was found on Saturday under a large tree on the prairie, where he had probably been seeking shelter.

CHARLESTON, Aug. 20.—The News and Courier to-day publishes reports showing great injury to cotton by drought, and stating that greater injury is threatened.

At Estancia Rancho, on Saturday, Joel W. Whitney, of Boston, and his brother-in-law A. Fernandez, attempted to serve a writ of ejectment on Manuel Otero.

WACO, Texas, Aug. 19.—On Thursday afternoon a cyclone struck Oglesby, demolishing the station house and a store, and scattering the goods all over the prairie.

HALIFAX, Aug. 19.—A bottle was picked up in the Bay of Fundy on Tuesday last and landed at Sandy Cove, N. S., which contained a half sheet of paper, evidently torn from a book and hurriedly written in pencil in Italian, without date.

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 19.—The American ship Hagerstown, Capt. Boyd, of Richmond, Maine, which arrived at this port to-day, forty-four days from Antwerp, reports that she narrowly escaped collision with an immense iceberg on the night of Aug. 2, latitude 43° 27' longitude 50° 25'.

LOUISIANA has 2,557 factories, working 30,071 hands, with a capital invested of \$18,313,974, paying annually in wages \$4,593,470, and yielding annually in products \$24,161,905.

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 19.—The last stroke of work on the big tunnel, 1,650 feet long, under Jones & Laughlin's iron works, this city, was completed to-day.

SEASONABLE SUGGESTIONS

The Poultry Yard.—Save the early chickens of this season for layers next year. Kill off all the old stock over two years old.

Eye for Seed.—In the Gulf States, sow only Southern raised seed. Make the soil very rich, and the crop will pay, as it will grow very rapidly after being pastured or mown.

Grub in the Head.—Last month and this are the ones in which the fly deposits the egg or living maggot in the nostrils of the sheep, unless the noses of the sheep and lambs are kept constantly smeared with pine tar.

Sow Some Eye.—Sow some rye now, for early green feed for milk cows in the spring. It will cause an increased flow of milk of rich quality in the spring before the ordinary grasses will be large enough to be of service.

Visit More.—Now that the harvesting season is over, meet in the farmer's club room, in the Grange hall, or at each other's homes. Husbands, wives, daughters and sons would do well to set apart a day for thus making the most of the bright side of farm life.

Keeping Sheep.—Sell the culls. Sell those that lag behind when you call them. It is a good rule not to keep a sheep after it attains the age of six years.

Special Manures for Wheat.—In order to supply to some soils the needed amount of nitrogen, phosphoric acid and potash, it may be necessary to harrow in before, or deposit with the drill, two hundred pounds of bone-meal and ammoniated superphosphate to the acre.

Set Some Strawberry Plants.—As soon as the early potatoes are dug and out of the way, set strawberry plants midway between the rows where the potatoes were grown.

Remove the Bees.—As soon as fall the boxes should be taken up. The delicate whiteness in comb-honey cannot be preserved in any other way, as the combs become discolored by the frequent passing of the bees over them.

Early Fall Plowing.—More of it should be done. The advantages are that it prevents many weeds from ripening their seeds, and during the warm weather in the fall the stalks and leaves ferment rapidly, whereas if plowed under late in the season they would remain undecomposed until the following spring.

Arrange to Drill in the Wheat.—Wheat put in with a drill will not be injured so much by alternate freezing and thawing during the winter months as that sown broadcast.

Ripening Grapes.—It is a mistake to remove a large amount of foliage from the vines at this season of the year. Grapes color better when partly or wholly shaded by leaves.

Try it.—Try the method of subdividing the tillable land into three tracts. Haul the manure from the barn yards and leave it in piles on the land that was in clover last season and is this.

This shows a total loss in round numbers of \$250,000,000, to be borne by the holders of stocks which were worth \$1,000,000,000 a year ago.

A great deal of the shrinkage is, of course, only temporary; some of the high level quotations were illusory, but after all allowances are made the net loss is enormous.

Fortunately the burden of it falls on those who brought it about. The outside public retired from stock speculations a year or more ago.

With all the shrinkage only three firms have failed through the slowness of their customers in putting up the necessary margins.
