AUTOBIOGRAPHY OF ANTHONY TROLLOPE.

Not the least interesting portion of Anthony Trollope's many autobiographies is that which is taken up with references to his mother. Mrs. Trollope was a woman much better known a quarter-century ago than she is now.

She was not one to whom Americans before the period of the war were very well-disposed. As the author of a peculiarly superficial book about the United States she enjoyed a notoriety not, on this side of the water, of an amiable character. It is not, however, for offenses of poor judgment that we wish here to speak of her. The thing for which she might be reproached could not be better dismissed by an American than it is in her son's remark that "her volumes were very bitter; but they were clever, and they saved the family from ruin." We are free to own that Mrs. Trollope seems to us to have been a remarkable woman. She wrote, indeed, works which will take no permanent place in literature, but she was possessed of great vigor of mind, and was a fertile writer, and in her season created an impression upon the reading world that is at least remembered, if not felt, to this day. When Trollope says of the books that "they saved the family from ruin," he touched the master-effect in the life of a strong individuality.

Trollope's parents had a large family that suffered constantly from the incapacity of the father. The father's death. The elder Trollope, it appears, was a man of irritable temper, which, the sons say, alienated the affections of all the children. He was one who had tried various businesses, and succeeded in none. Possessed of the family literary ambition, he labored for years over a massive scholastic venture which was not finished at his death, and never was to be published. A victim of ill-health, he found to other drawbacks this supreme misfortune superadded. In every way the family found themselves in difficult straits through a long course of years. Part of them came to America and opened a bazaar in a Western city; and here, too, money was lost rather than gained. The father was unable to hold his head above water. Anthony was educated by endowed scholarship, and in latter school years found even a petty allowance of spending-money stopped. It is likely that by one skilled in the philosophy of life it would be found that all the unhappiness came of the father's literary infatuation, which, while interfering constantly and grievously with that business of life from which attention should not be distracted, did, at the same time, effect nothing whatever in literature either towards gaining fame or of money needed in the demands of a household.

It was in one of the darkest hours of the family troubles that Mrs. Trollope's capacities unfolded and revealed themselves. She came from America, and from the bazaar experiment, with no evident bright hopes of a fair future. The publication of her book on the United States was shortly after effected. At this time she was fifty-one years old, and had previously never written anything, and therefore never made any money by her pen. Success came at once and with wonderful emphasis. At last a way was found out of the family slough. Thenceforward she knew she could write and effect much by it, and she did write. Indefatigably the new vocation was accepted. For over a quarter of a century, during which she produced one hundred and fourteen volumes, she continued her brave and noble work. Discouragements and sad trials of a domestic nature came at one time thickly, but appear never to have lessened the cheerfulness of her nature. It will be acknowledged that a woman immersed in the duties of a household in which her husband had several children were together sick almost to the point of death—so sick that, in fact, death did result to them all—who could, with all the melancholy thoughts consequent to such faithfully-discharged demands, continue literary labor that would seem above all else to require peace and undivided attention, must be, beyond question, the possessor of a high nature. Indeed, Mrs. Trollope fulfilled all the ends of a fine career, and rescued her family from dangers calling for strong treatment at a time of life in which even men often loosen their hold upon labor and prepare for ease.

Trollope pays careful tribute to his mother, and presents her qualities approvingly without any tendency to exaggerate the virtues of the family. At the same time no word of rebuke attends the recital of the failings of the father, whose good parts were indeed many but urged upon mistaken pathways. Our own admiration for the mother is unqualified. It is, indeed, true that for one who chooses to look it is easy to discover countless rebukes of man's denial to women of any capacity outside of the purely domestic; and it is for this reason that we add this record to other accounts of the deeds of nobly-qualified women. Trollope's book is a genial narrative in which the unsifted tribute to his mother is the finest passage.
