TROLLOPE New Yor FREAT WOMAN

Not the least interesting portion of Anthony Trollope's manly autobiography is that which is taken up with references to his mother. Mrs. Trollope was a woman much better known a She was not one to whom Americans before the period of the war were very well-disposed. As the author of a peculiarly superficial book about the United States, she enjoyed a netoriety not, on on this side of the water, of an amiable character. It is not, however, for offenses of poor judgment that we wish here to speak of her. The thing for which she might be reproached could not be better dismissed by an American than it is in her son's remark that "her volumes were very bitter; but they were clever, and they saved the family from ruin." We are free to own that Mrs. Trollope seems to us to have been a remarkable woman. She wrote, indeed, works which will take no permanent place in literature, but she was possessed of great vigor of mind, and was a fertile writer, and in her season created an impression upon the reading world that is at least remembered, if not felt, to this day, When Trollope says of the books that "they saved the family from ruin," he touched the master-effect in the life of a strong individuality.

Possessed of the family literary ambition, he labored for years over health, he found to other drawbacks this supreme misfortune superadded.
