Large Sum to the State.

To-day at noon Col. A. B. Andrews president of the Western North Carolina Worth a check on the Citizen's national bank for \$600,000. The treasurer gave him a receipt for this and Col. Andrews, signed as president of the W. N. C. railroad, and as attorney for Messrs. A. S. Buford, W. P. Clyde and T. M. Logan, as assignees of W. J. Best.

On August 8, I881, these gentlemen yesterday by the Republican convention Carolina Railroad, under the terms of the act providing for the sale of them of the State's interest in the said road, which act was ratified March 29, 1880.

The receipts signed yesterday by the treasurer sells and transfers to the assignees above named the \$520,000 in bonds so deposited with him under the previous act.
