Effect of Gov. Hendricks's Speech.
 CHICAGO, July 14.—Mr. Bell Mann, a well known druggist of this city, who is under indictment for collusion with Daniel Corrigan in obtaining money by fraudulent vouchers on the Medical Bureau of the United States Naval Department, was released on \$5,000 bail to-day for appearance before the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia. It is said that the funds in question amount to over \$30,000. The statement is published here that Mann's indictment was precipitated by the recent speech of ex-Gov. Hendricks.
