Soaking Seed Corn.

Farmers who are troubled by the crow s pulling up their corn in spring, should not put off the purchasing of material for making a solution in which to sonk their seed corn until it is wanted at planting time. Many do this, and regret it when they see their young crop ven, and pulled by the mischievous crows. The materials needed are gas tar and blue vitriol. For six bushels of corn, a half pint of tar and two pounds of blue vitriol are sufficient. The tar should be put into a pail, with one gallon of warm water added to it, and then well stirred. be skimmed off. Mix the vitriol in another vessel, and also with one gallon of water, and when both are
