WM. F. HOWLAND, CHAIRMAN, AND PARTY ORGANIZATION.

EDITOR JOURNAL.—I published the following open letter in the last issue of the Telephone, April 10, 1885:
HON. THOS. G. SKINNER,
Member of Congress:
DEAR SIR:—I asserted in your room at the Metropolitan Hotel, that the resolutions on file in your office, bearing the signature of Wm. F. Howland, Chm'n, and Joseph Pigott, Sec'y, were fraudulent—I am now prepared to prove the fraud. A majority of the "defacto" Democratic Executive Committee of Carteret—there is no "de jure" executive committee in the county—state that they have neither attended nor been summoned to attend any meeting of said committee since Mr. Cleveland was elected in November, 1884. The minority, consisting of Wm. F. Howland, Joseph Pigott and David Pierce, met and passed the resolutions. Mr. Wm. F. Howland takes the custom house, with Joseph Pigott, Esq., as Deputy. Together, they give Mr. David Pierce the postoffice.
If you will send me a copy of the resolutions for publication, I will show up the fraud through the columns of the Telephone.

There seems to be some complaint about the action of a majority of our County Executive Committee in endorsing me for Postmaster at this place. There is an old saying, and a very true one, that a drowning man will catch at a straw; and that is the case with those who wish to show the people of Carteret county that a majority of the Democratic Executive Committee have not endorsed me for that position. The fact is there was no call for a meeting of the committee, but there was a majority in town in person and by proxy on the day when the resolution was drawn up. Five of the committee were in my office. I held an endorsement from Mr. Webb, and Mr. Pigott voted for Mr. Russell Willis by proxy. That made seven, and that number is more than usually met, and it was understood that what was done would be satisfactory to all. Mr. Pigott wrote the resolution and signed it as secretary. Mr. Howland came in, asked if that was a resolution of a majority of the committee, and was told that it was; whereupon he signed it as chairman. Now, if five members of the committee in person, one by proxy and the endorsement of another don't constitute a majority of ten, I would like to know how many it requires? But they will say there was no call for the meeting. That is true, for there was no authority to call a committee together to endorse a man for a

local office; but as they were present they did adopt it. That, I claim, is the duty of the local committee. They represent Beaufort township, and those outside the patronage of the office have no right to say who shall be Postmaster at Beaufort. That I claim is with the business men and Democrats of Beaufort township. Those, I claim, have also endorsed me. I claim to be a Democrat, I am strictly a party man, believe in party organization, and if I have ever done anything contrary to party organization I am not aware of it. Can my opponent say as much? I will leave it to the good Democrats of Carteret county to decide.

"DE FACTO" ET "DE JURE."
The News and Observer of Thursday, May 1st, 1884, publishes the Democratic Plan of Party Organization to which I call Wm. F. Howland's attention.
Rooms Dem. Central Ex. Committee, Raleigh, May 20th, 1883.

This committee hereby publish the plan of organization of the Democratic party compiled from the rules and amendments heretofore adopted by the State Democratic Executive Committee: **TOWNSHIP ORGANIZATION.**

1. The unit of county organization shall be the township. In each township there shall be an executive committee to consist of five active Democrats, who shall be elected by the Democratic voters of the several townships in meetings called by the county executive committee. And said committee so elected shall elect one of its members as chairman, who shall preside at all said committee meetings.

2. The several township executive committees shall convene at the meetings of the several county conventions, or at any time and place that a majority of them may elect, and shall elect a county executive committee, to consist of not less than five members, one of whom shall be designated chairman, who shall preside at all of said committee meetings.

3. In case there shall be a failure on the part of any township to elect its executive committee for the period of thirty days, the county executive committee shall appoint said committee from the Democratic voters of said township.

4. That for the purpose of fully inaugurating this system, the present county executive committees shall continue in office until their successors are elected under this system, and shall exercise all the functions pertaining to said office under this system of organization.

Davis, Republican Collector of the Port of Beaufort: "I WILL GIVE YOU THE FEES AND SALARY OF THE OFFICE FROM NOW TILL THE FIRST DAY OF JUNE IF YOU WILL RESIGN."

If the Chairman denies the above assertion, I will produce another certificate.
Col. Davis holds on, under the "Tenure of office Act." I have no certificate to prove that Mr. Wm. F. Howland takes the Custom House. Wm. F. Howland, Chairman, having failed to receive his commission as Democratic Collector of the Port of Beaufort, I have no certificate to prove that Joseph Pigott, Esq., is his Deputy.

Postmaster-General Vilas is working slowly—very slowly—and I have no certificate to prove that Mr. David Pierce is Postmaster.
To the worthy "Trio" I lift my hat and make the *amende honorable* in a more public manner than I made the charges in the Carteret county telephone, viz.: through the columns of the New Berne JOURNAL.

To Wm. F. Howland, chairman, I wish to say in a private way, "There are 53,200,001 people in this country and you are only one of them—only one.—Think of this, WILLIAM, once in a while when you get to wondering what would happen to the world if you should die." The original certificates and other papers, of which the above are copies, are on file either in Washington, D. C., or in my office at this place.
