CITY ORDINANCE. CHAP. 3, SEC. 6. No brick, stone wood or other substance obstructing the streets shall be suffered to be in the same. And no person shall place in any street or alley or upon any sideany street or alley or upon any side-walk, boxes, casks, crates, barrels or SPRING and other obstruction; provided, however, that building material, earth and other We obstructions of like character may be, by permission of the mayor, in writing, allowed under such restrictions as he may prescribe. Every person offending against these provisions shall, upon con-viction, be fined five dollars for each and every offence, and a like sum for each and every day that such obstructions are permitted to remain.

An Act :Relating to The Practice of Medicine In This State.

The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

Section 1. That section three thousand one hundred and twenty-two of the Code be amended by striking out the words "Provided no person who shall practice in violation of this chapter

Sec. 2. That section three thousand one hundred and thirty-two of the Code be amended by adding at the end of said section the following: And any medicine or surgery in this State for act, without first having obtained license from said Board of Examiners, shall bill for services rendered in the practice of medicine or surgery, or any of the branches thereof, but shall also be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or imprisoned, at the shall not be construed to apply to wowife: And provided further, that this act shall not apply to regularly licensed
