TWO BRAVE HEROES.

A Grand Expedition Down White Oak River From the Quaker Bridge Road, by Messrs. C. Koonce and J. H. Francis.

On the morning of the 5th of May these two brave men left their pleasant homes and made their way down the lonely Quaker Bridge road with guns in hand, accompanied by their half friends, a small fire dog and a half hound. Thus equipped they were fearless. From their faces you could see that they were a way of the many dangers and hardships that lay before them; but like Lewis and Clark, they were determined to learn something of the unexplored country. After reaching the river they stepped into their boat and commenced their dangerous journey, not knowing what moment they would be attacked by the wild beasts of the forest, but having every confidence in their faithful dogs and trusty guns, they proceeded rapidly down the lovely canal cut by convicts, and soon were lost sight of in the thick forest. After going down some distance they came to a large lake, 75 yards across. This they thought was the home of catfish and mud turtles. Around this lake the growth was not so thick, plenty signs of bear and cat. From this led two small streams, from 4 to 6 feet in water, and about 8 or 10 feet wide. Going down one of these streams some distance they became worried, and, like honest fellows, they concluded, after Koonce had gone ashore and climbed up a tree, making all the discoveries he could, to return home. They were met in the evening by some friends who expected to learn something from these brave explorers, but they refused to be interviewed, saying that they would give the public the benefit of their discoveries some time. The news had gone on ahead to their families, and they were awaiting their arrival. The brave adventures soon came in sight and amid the shouts of the children, the barking of the dogs, they entered their home fully disatisfied with their expedition.

The Bicycle Race at Charlotte, N. C. CHARLOTTE, N. C., May 28.—John S. Prince, of Washington, D. C., the champion bicyclist of America, won the four-mile race against four separate trotting horses, on the grounds of the Carolina Fair Association to-day, and beat this world's record, making one mile and four yards in the unprecedented time of two minutes and 34 seconds. His time was taken with stop watches by three members of the Charlotte Bicycle Club, the watches varying only a quarter of a second and the slowest time only being recorded. The Fair Association will present Mr. Prince with a beautiful medal in honor of the event.

Notice to Mariners. Notice is hereby given that, on and after June 1, 1885, a fixed white light, shown from a Western River lantern, will be exhibited from the wooden tower recently constructed on Danmanter Point, near Newburgh, Hudson river, New York.

The focal plane is 31 feet above the ground, and 48 feet above mean low water. A fog-bell, struck by machinery, will be sounded, given a volley of blows, at intervals of 20 seconds, during thick and foggy weather.
